BEST MODE OF APPLYING MANURES TO THE SOIL.
Mr. President:—In obedience to the requirements of this Club, I offer as an annual contribution, a few thoughts on what may be considered the best mode of applying manures as are usually made from stables, farm pens, and otherwise.

When it is taken into view that clay usually possesses the power of absorbing the fertilizing properties of manure, it seems evident that soil of the same degree of tenacity with a medium amount of loam will derive all that is valuable from common manure, and that the greater area its application, that it should be so applied as to penetrate and intimately mixed with through all of its parts.

A FEW THINGS WHICH EVERYBODY OUGHT TO KNOW.
A quart of peas sown in a shallow bar, fifteen inches wide by eighteen long, at any time of the year, and cut when about four or five inches high, and boiled like spinach, with a little salt, makes a most delicious dish.
