

Intendant's Report.

REPRESENTATIVE OF THE TOWN of Charlotte, for the year A.D. 1858, will submit the following, for the present financial year, the 1st day of December, instant, to the Reporter of the Treas., and to the Commissioners of said Town, for their adoption, to be read before the House of Commons, of said Town.

It is to be known, that there has been a sum of old outstanding debts against Town not and past off by the order of the Commissioners for the present year, which has the liability to the nominal sum of \$1,450, of which, and such other amounts as follows, being paid off, viz: To Agent of Piedmont \$200 for five hundred dollars for the Erie Railroad; a balance still due to the N. & W. for the construction of streets, done in 1857, to Miller & Parker \$62.06; to P. & B. & W. \$69.562, to W. J. Yates for \$10.63; to the Charlotte and Taylorsville Road Company \$210, being the 10 per cent, interest allowed them for the use of the plank road; also, a balance due David Alexander and a sister due S. A. Harris, attorney general.

and would bring us away, that in addition to the above outstanding debts which are now due, there is to be paid during the ensuing year.

The annual interest on Bonds given to the Male and Female Colleges of Charlotte and the sum of \$600 will be due the said year at 6% lighting the town, or as per contract entered into by the Board of Commissioners, so that the annual interest on Bonds given to the Male and Female Colleges of Charlotte and the sum of \$600 will fall due in the next month \$4.00. 63.

Your Intendant will further inform you, that there are accounts to the credit of the Town for arrears of Taxes for the years 1856, '57, '58, '59, '60, and '61, amounting in the aggregate \$771.38.

None of this amount may be collected, I would say, but would suggest that the same amount may be collected, and the same may be done by the Town in two or three years, if not more, of smaller, which of course, would bring in bounded dollars, and about one-half dollar in notes, taken for taxes.

I would say that I have tried to be an Officer of the Town of Charlotte, and of my ability. If I have failed to meet your expectations, I am only too ready to do so, for it is my duty to do my best, and further, I feel under many obligations to our great country for their services in an attempt to secure the peace of the Town, and in preserving the regulations, imposed by the Board of Commissioners, all which is respectfully submitted.
