

Thus it is seen that the route from Atlanta to Richmond, by Danville, is 69 miles shorter than the route by Knoxville, and 133 miles shorter than by the route by Wilmington.

As that the route from Atlanta by Charlotte, Greensboro, and Danville to Richmond will be without a great deal of distance, and would be the most direct, that route, a connection between Lynchburg and Danville, (a distance of 75 miles) puts our route still 76 miles ahead, and will still leave us without a rival. The amount of trade along this route will be as surprising to the friends of the North-Carolina Road as it has been to the friends of the Virginia and Tennessee Road, and will pass through the State at least 150 miles.

Believing, as we do, the best interests of the State will be subserved by the passage of the bill, we beg leave to differ from the majority of the committee, and earnestly recommend the passage of the bill.

The Minority Report.

We have given this week the Minority Report of the committee of the House of Commons on Internal Improvements on the bill to charter a railroad from Greensboro to Danville. It is well written and shows conclusively to our mind the great importance to North Carolina of this connection. Gov. Morehead is supposed to be the author of the report, and if he can so strongly argue in favor of this connection, when he is so deeply interested in building up Morehead City, we are forced to believe that the measure is one of prime importance and should meet the approval of the Legislature. But it is to be regretted that the jealousy of some persons are so great that they will prevent others from enjoying a success which they cannot themselves receive.

Deaths on the Cars.

The Alton Democrat notices a touching incident, which took place on the down train on the Chicago, Alton and St. Louis Railroad. A poor woman was on the cars with a young infant in her arms. She had a ticket to St. Louis, and when half way down a lady passenger discovered that the infant was dead—died in its mother's arms, and she had kept the fact unknown till she should be put off the cars. This case excited much attention and feeling among the passengers. A handsome purse was raised for her and the conductor telegraphed to Alton for a coffin at his own expense. Being thus relieved the woman passed on to St. Louis to meet her husband.

The Fayetteville Coalfields Railroad.

We are gratified to learn that the bill to aid in the construction and equipment of the Fayetteville Coalfields Railroad passed its second reading in the Senate on the 4th instant, by a vote of 25 to 14. This vote leads us to hope that the bill will finally pass the Senate. This is a most important road not only to that section of country through which it will run, but to the whole State, and more especially so, since there is a great probability that the General Government will erect a Naval Depot on Deep River.

The Yacht Wanderer.

It appears that the crew of this vessel landed on the coast of Georgia, a short time ago several hundred Africans, which were spread in various sections of the State. The Federal authorities have taken the matter in hand and the crew has been arrested and witnesses are being summoned from various sections of the state to testify in the case, which has been progressing at Savannah. The fact seems to be that Judge Henry stated that the evidence before him was sufficient to warrant his committal and he should do so accordingly.

Interposition of Gov. Ellis.

Mr. Editor: I have read with some surprise an article signed "R. M. S." in reply to the minority report of the Committee on the Danville Connection. This is written by the Hon. R. M. Saunders, who is a Director in the N. C. R. R. Road.

From the two articles we have had from the Judge recently, on Rail Roads, he has manifestly mistaken his calling. He has given us merely a single fax in either article. He says "this Charlotte free trade road," would carry all the trade to Virginia. This would be at war with the interest of Charlotte and greatly injure her prosperity, if true. It would take all the wheat trade to Salisbury which now comes to Charlotte and make that the great depot of the N. C. R. R. Then this road would get much freight which is hauled to Charlotte in wagons, which it can never get without better markets than Wilmington and Raleigh.

But the Judge, strange to say, contradicts the statement made in the minority report, that the highest rates of freight are charged to Greensboro. Is he a Director in the N. C. R. R. and does not know this fact? Does he think that the N. C. R. R. will do anything else terminate at Raleigh? His remarks about the Danville road and other roads are about as a par with his knowledge of the tariff of the N. C. R. R. He says the "friends of the N. C. R. R. do not desire to force the farmers of DuRoi river to send their produce on their road." Why then try to force the whole trade of the west to Raleigh and Wilmington by designing the Danville Connection? Do North Carolina men justify as Virginia. The whole effect of the article is to show how we can force North Carolina farmers to ship to certain markets and so on. His argument resolves itself into this: "That you, N. C. farmers would have no good market, if we would let you build this Danville Connection. You would get 20 cents more per bushel for your wheat—add this increase plus to the 200,000 bushels of wheat you shipped on the road last year and it would put in your pockets \$400,000 more than you received for your wheat crop. You would get rich too fast. You must divide the profits of your wheat crop between Wilmington and Raleigh and other export towns of N. C. They must have their commission and profits on your wheat, otherwise we cannot have big commercial cities. If we are to have these cities they are to be built and kept up at your expense. We, Raleigh and Wilmington, helped to build the N. C. road on this express agreement. Your western farmers and merchants sold our right to build your road without our express consent. In good faith you are bound hand and foot and have no right to build any Railroad without permission from us. That members of the Legislature at the session of 1848 when the N. C. road was chartered, sold to us all your rights to build Railroads anywhere."

Now this is the plain English of the learned Judge's argument. And it is the better opinion that the high Judicial Functionary has descended from his position to mingle in the political arena and control the legislature of the State on the subject of internal improvement in relation to which he appears to be wholly unqualified. He has scarcely advanced a single fact in either of his articles. He has not touched a single position taken in the very able Report of the Minority. What say the farmers and merchants of the west to this logic of Judge Saunders? Are you slaves to an eastern tyranny with partial teachers in the west, or are you free men? Old Necessburg stands where she always has, for equal rights and privileges.

Gov. Ellis's Inaugural Address.

Below are the opening sentences of the Inaugural Address of the Governor of North Carolina, delivered at Raleigh, on the 1st instant, before both branches of the Legislature.

This day we have assembled as a free people, through our representatives, to exercise a succession in the office of Chief Executive Magistrate of the State; a succession which, like those preceding it, being afforded by the free action of the popular will, presents to the world a renewed evidence, that with us, "all political power is vested in, and derived from the people only."

Based upon this great principle, our political organization, formed though it was in the most unpropitious hour of a doubtful revolution, has, under Divine superintendence, been sustained and preserved, through almost an entire century; securing to our people the blessings of peace, and presenting at stated periods, as prescribed by law, the spectacle we are allowed to look upon to-day. From the inauguration of the government to the present time, one Chief Magistrate after another has quietly departed from office, upon the expiration of his term, and his successor has been duly installed, without disturbance or commotion, and with the ready acquiescence of a united people.

During the same period almost all the nations of the earth, beyond the circle of American States, possessing forms of government similar to our own, have been convulsed by international violence and discord. In many of them revolution has rapidly succeeded revolution, and war has followed fast in the footsteps of war, venturing with rapidly the blood and substance of their distracted people.
