TERRIBLE RAVAGE OF YELLOW FEVER.—The yellow fever has been very fatal on both sides of the Rio Grande River, in Texas and Mexico. The Rio Grande Journal, of the 21st ultimo, says:

WE learn through a person just from Edinburg, in Hidalgo County, that town and its Mexican sister, Reynosa, have been some time suffering from a fever in most respects identical with the yellow fever, which devastated our region last year.

STREET BEGGING IN NEW YORK.—A steady and determined system of exterminating street begging has been commenced in New York, and it will be persisted in till not a vagrant alms collector will dare to go into the street.

HEAVY SWINDLER OF A COUNTRYMAN.—A swindler from North Carolina, named Kivett, purchased in New York, last week, a sewing machine and other articles. He came to this city on Friday and took up quarters at the Franklin House.

NEWSPAPER DECISION.—The Supreme Court of Indiana has made a decision which has an important bearing upon the interests of the newspaper press. A controversy existed relative to a charge for advertising between the Commissioners of Hamilton county and the Patriot newspaper.

RELIGIOUS FREEDOM.—The Piedmontese Gazette contains a decree by the Governor General of Lombardy, abolishing the old (Austrian) laws, which made a difference between the inhabitants because of their religious opinions.

DEATH FROM CAMPFIRE.—According to a report of deaths, injuries, and confusions, resulting from the use of campfires, other burning fluids, kept by Mr. E. Meriam, of Brooklyn, since July 22, 1859, reports that since that date the deaths from this cause have amounted to three hundred and seventy, and four hundred and seventy-seven persons injured, many of whom were not expected to survive the injuries they received.

ARREST OF TWO MURDERERS.—Two men were arrested in Portsmouth Va., by Officers Johnson and Matthews, for a murder committed somewhere in North Carolina in March last. Their names are Joseph Hunter Winslow, and Harlow Winslow, brothers.

DEEP RIVER IRON.—A friend who is busily engaged in preparations for work in the Deep River region has presented us with a rod of iron, some three feet long and half an inch through, made from ore from the Tyson place on Deep River.

NO GREAT HARM.—A man named Pratt was tried before the Recorder's Court in Memphis, the other day, for whipping his wife. The Recorder fined him \$30, but took occasion to say: "It is no great harm to whip some wife, provided the public is not disturbed by the operation."

LIBERALITY OF MR. A. T. STEWART.—The New York correspondent of the Cleveland Leader, says: "I was told a few evenings since that Mr. A. T. Stewart, the merchant prince of New York, intends to build a large Home for Widows and Indigent Women, and endow it most liberally, and that if one million dollars is not enough, he will use two millions. Mr. Stewart says it is to the women he is indebted for his fortune, and now in return he will use it to benefit them, without regard to sect or creed."
