Those who use barn-yards open and exposed to the winds and rain, and who permit the washings to run off to creeks and streams, have doubtless heard that with manure sheds, and properly arranged tanks retaining the drainage of the manure heap, and pumps, obtain better results than by the open barn-yard practice.

MANURE HEAPS. If your compost heaps are under sheds and refuse to heat, either turn them in mild weather to encourage fermentation, or make holes in the top of the heap with a crowbar, and pour in large quantities of boiling water or boiling spent ley.

HOW TO MAKE A BALKY HORSE PULL. A correspondent of the Cotton Planter gives the following method for making an obstinate horse or mule pull on a hill or anywhere else, when his muscles are equal to the work.

Take a small rope, double it, make a loop at the double end, and draw it snugly around the under jaw of the animal, just below his front teeth, with the loop under his shoulder.
