Those who read the Morning Star in the old South State, without regard to domination, regard it as one of the soundest, and most attractive religious papers published in our country.

In 1865 the people of this State found themselves among the stranded fragments and floating timbers of one of the most desolating civil wars mentioned in history. RATTLESNAKE BITES.

Simple Rules For Treatment If You Have the Nerve to Use Them.

The treatment of a rattlesnake wound resolves itself into the application of a few very simple rules. In the first place, a person wounded by a snake usually does the very thing he should not do—that is, goes tearing off at top speed for the nearest human habitation, thereby increasing the circulation and disseminating the virus through the system more rapidly.

With a sharp knife make an X incision over the wound, taking care to penetrate deeper than the fangs have done. If he has good teeth and no canker in his mouth, he may now suck vigorously upon the wound. It does no good to suck the original wound. It is quite difficult to get any virus back through an opening not greater in caliber than a fine needle.
