Old People About Snow Camp.

A correspondent at Snow Camp, under date of May 2nd, writes The Gleaner as follows:

Mr. Aaron McPherson died Tuesday morning, May 2nd, aged 86 years and 4 months. He was 86 on 31st of last December. He was buried at Spring Friends church at 1 a. m. Wednesday.

Within a radius of one mile (there is a point from which all the homes can be seen) there are four old men, three of them in bed and helpless. They are Mr. McPherson, whose death is mentioned above, William Hadley, aged 87 years; George Burnett (col'd), 85 years old; and Henry Workman, about 80. Mr. Workman is able to be out, but he is totally blind.

This is an unusual record for a small community in the country.

Last Saturday at the election held in Durham and Paterson townships, Durham county, the proposed bond issue of \$165,000 for the railway was defeated. The President, Mr. Junius H. Harden, had put up a valiant fight in which he was opposed by John Sprunt Hill leading, together with the news circulated that Capt. T. O. Troy had the means to build the Greensboro, Atlantic & Northern over practically the same route without any bond issue. These turned the tide and defeat followed, which is the only defeat the proposition has had, but it should be understood that Mr. Harden has not yet thrown up his hands. He is no quitter.
