# Fertilizer To Corn.

Progressive Farmer.

A reader asks if we advise two pplications of fertilizers to corn. It seems quite certain that in so far as phosphoric acid and potash are concerned it does not pay to make two applications, because they are not leached from the soil by the water that passes down hrough it. If no nitrogen is used then the answer to the question is

an unqualified no.

Possibly the most satisfactory way of applying nitrogen to the corn crop is to use some such nitrogen supplying material as cottonseed meal in rather smal! quantity when planting and then sing nitrate of soda as a side lressing when the corn is about wo and a half to three feet high It should be put out before the starting of the formation of ears, s proper fertilization at the right ime may have an important influence in determining the number of ears produced and consequently

Employment agents are doing their ut most to obtain farm and garden workers by offering highly increased wages but their appeals are unbacked. The public employment bureau said that existing conditions were unprecedent-ed and that there was no relief in sight until after the close of the war. "You can't get a man to work on a farm for \$25 or \$30 a month when he can earn \$3 a day in a factory with eight hours' work a day," said an official of a state employment bureau.
