CHAPEL HILL LETTER.

Cor. of The Gleaner. Chapel Hill, N. C., April 9.—The fifth annual final contest of the High School Debating Union of N. C. will be held at Chapel Hill on April 19th and 20th.

Eighty schools were successful in their triangular debates on March 30th, from a total of 325 schools in 92 counties participating, and will send their team numbering 325 student debaters to enter the final contest for the Aycock Memorial Cup.

The schools of Columbus, Polk county; Manteo, Dare county; Townsville, Vance county; Mt. Olive, Wayne county; and Olney, Northampton county, will be represented by four girls each. The total number of girls from the various schools to appear in the final contest will be 107.

Complete plans are being made for the entertainment of the visitors and a definite program has been mapped out.
