THE OLD TYPE PASSES.

New Hog Needs "Range" and "Stretch."

As times and methods change, the tools made use of by man also undergo a change.

The ox is supplanted by the tractor, and in the final analysis, time is our only real capital and upon our use of time depends our success in life.

No matter how excellent our equipment, the manner in which it is made use of determines its value.

In this connection, it is interesting to note the change which has taken place in the type of hog made use of by the best informed breeders and pork producers of the country.

No longer do we find the short, dumpy, blocky, low-built hog in evidence on the farms of such men; it is simply another case of the stone which was formerly rejected becoming the corner-stone, for range and "stretch" are highly regarded in the case of young stock, and gilts of this type are selected for breeding.

The reason for this is a very satisfactory one. It is because of the fact that the profitable hog is the one which makes rapid growth largely upon crops harvested from the field by himself.

Care must be exercised to avoid the other extreme of coarseness and lack of quality. Present prices of feed make it a hazardous undertaking to attempt the production of pork through the use of inferior animals, no matter whether pure bred or scrubs.

Good hogs, well cared for, in reasonable number, are still profitable and will always continue so. The other kind never did pay, except periodically, and this is not their paying period.

INTERESTING STATISTICS ABOUT UNIV. STUDENTS.

They Number 1,350; The Counties Represented; Church Affiliations; 41 of Them Women.

Cor. of The Gleaner. Chapel Hill, Dec. 23.—Statistics gathered by Dr. T. J. Wilson, Jr., registrar of the University of North Carolina, in his annual report to the president, show that the number of students who have registered at the University this fall is 1,350.

Of the students at the university now 94.7 per cent are North Carolinians, representing 92 of the 100 counties in the State. Mecklenburg leads all other counties with 67 representatives, Guilford follows closely with 65.

More than half the university students are either Methodists or Baptists, with the Methodists leading, 432 to 341. Presbyterians follow with 238 and Episcopalians with 152.

Fathers of university students are interested in nearly every business profession to be found in the State that extends from the mountains to the sea. Farmers lead with 359 students and merchants follow with 196.

The number of women now studying at the university, not counting the 648 in the summer school, is 41. Three are studying law, three are in medicine, two in pharmacy, three are graduate students in English and one in Latin, and one is taking a course in electrical engineering.

Undergraduates continue to lead the professional schools in numbers. Of the 1,350 students, 1,048 are undergraduates and 302 are graduate students. In the professional schools law leads with 139 students, followed by medicine with 63 and pharmacy with 55.

This does not provide the necessary dormitory space, but it is all the Committee felt justified in undertaking at the present time.

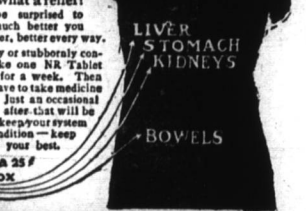
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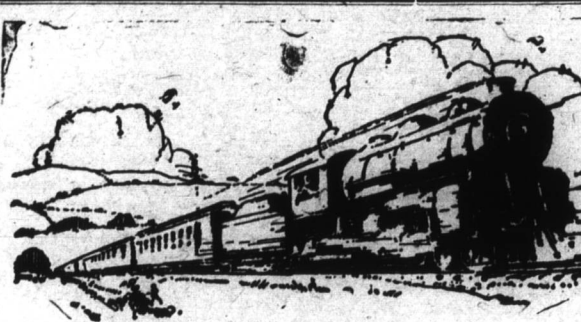

An Ordinance.

An Ordinance Providing for the Issuance of \$50,000.00 School Bonds of the Town of Graham.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Graham, North Carolina:

Section 1. That pursuant to the provisions of the Public Law of North Carolina known as "A General Act Relating to Municipal Finance," as provided in Chapter 138 Public Laws of 1917, and Chapter 178 of Public Laws of 1919, and the several amendments thereto, that the town of Graham, North Carolina, issue and sell its bonds for the purpose of erecting and equipping new school buildings for the public schools in the town of Graham by building additions to, and remodeling the present public school building for the white race, and equipping the same in a modern and up-to-date manner, and by acquiring a new site and erecting a new building for the public school for the colored race; the said buildings to be constructed and remodeled to be non-fire proof buildings, as defined in said law, the outer walls to be hard, incombustible materials, and the probable period of usefulness of the said buildings, for the erection of which the said bonds are to be issued, is declared to be thirty years.

Section 2. That the maximum, aggregate principal amount of the said bonds be Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00). All details as to issuance of said bonds to be fixed by resolution by the Board of Commissioners of the town of Graham, as provided by said law.

Section 3. That a tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of the said bonds shall be annually levied and collected by the proper authorities of the town of Graham.

Section 4. That a statement of the debt of the town of Graham has been filed with the Clerk of said town pursuant to said Municipal Finance Act, and is open to public inspection.

Section 5. The average assessed valuation of property subject to taxation by the said town of Graham for the three fiscal years in which taxes were last levied, as shown by said statement, is \$1,612,377.00.

Section 6. The amount of the net debt of the town of Graham, North Carolina, outstanding, authorized, or to be authorized, as shown by said statement, including the proposed issue of \$100,000.00 sewer bonds is \$201,148.33.

Section 7. That the governing body of the town of Graham deeming it advisable to obtain the assent of the voters of the said town before issuing the said bonds, the said ordinance shall take effect when approved by the majority of the voters of the town of Graham, North Carolina, at a special election to be held in said town for said purpose, as provided by law, on Tuesday, January 20, 1920.

The foregoing ordinance was passed on the 1st day of December, 1919, and was first published on the 11th day of December, 1919.

Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said ordinance must be commenced within thirty days after its first publication.

An Ordinance Providing for the Issuance of \$100,000.00 Sewer Bonds of the Town of Graham.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Graham, North Carolina:

Section 1. That pursuant to the provisions of the Public Law of North Carolina known as "A General Act Relating to Municipal Finance," as provided in Chapter 138 Public Laws of 1917, and Chapter 178 of Public Laws of 1919, and the several amendments thereto, that the town of Graham, North Carolina, issue and sell its bonds for the purpose of laying out, locating, constructing, building, and equipping a sanitary sewer system for the town of Graham, North Carolina, an acquiring all property rights and property, and paying for same, together with all labor and equipment necessary to construct such a system, all of which is hereby deemed and declared to be a necessary expense for the said town.

Section 2. That the maximum, aggregate principal amount of the said bonds be One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00). All details as to issuance of said bonds to be fixed by resolution by the Board of Commissioners of the town of Graham, as provided by said law.
