LOCAL NEWS.

The County Commissioners meet in regular monthly session next Monday.

One of the heaviest rainfalls for months was Monday night. It commenced to rain again the early part of last night and is still raining today.

The many friends of Mrs. Ben B. Holt will sympathize with her in the death of her father, Mr. A. B. Clark, who died Sunday evening at his home in Pittsboro. He had been in ill health for many months and his death did not come as a surprise.

Rev. J. G. Truitt, a brilliant young man and former pastor of Graham Christian church, who went from here to News Ferry, Va., has entered the Theological Seminary at Princeton University, Princeton, N. J.

Mr. Lonnie B. Ezell of Graham, who is a student at Elon College, is the editor of "Maroon and Gold," the student publication of the College. He graduated from Graham High School over two years ago and in the latter part of the war was with the U. S. Battleship Nevada.

The second annual Community Fair at Whitesett will be held on Thursday, Oct. 7th. Almost all the departments of the big fair will be represented. A good list of cash and special premiums will be given. Good speakers, good music, good exhibits and enjoyable entertainment are promised.

On Wednesday morning about midway between Graham and Haw River Bessie Freeland, colored, was shot by her step-son, Harvey Freeland, a boy about 17 years old. The woman was carried to Rainey Hospital for attention. One of her arms was badly shot up and several shot entered her side.

Our townsman, Mr. Sam T. Johnston, contractor and builder, has taken the contract to build a large feed mill in Greensboro for Messrs. J. G. and Charles Guthrie, the former of Graham and the latter of Smithfield, both of whom have been in the milling business for several years. The building will be 30x88 feet and three stories.

Sunday before last at the Haw River church, when Dr. P. H. Fleming, the Pastor, had closed the service, a member of the congregation arose and asked the privilege of saying a word. He said the church had requested him to ask Dr. Fleming to call at Mr. P. S. Dixon's tailor shop the next day and get a suit of clothes that he would find waiting for him. This was kind on the part of the church and highly appreciated by Dr. Fleming.

The Christian Sun, the organ of the Southern Christian Convention, published at Burlington, has increased its subscription price from \$2.00 to \$2.50 for the year, effective Oct. 1st. It is a 16-page paper, pages 9 by 12 inches. Even at that price the subscriptions will not pay the expense of producing the paper. As in the case of the Sun as to cost of producing, the same is true as to about every paper, religious or secular, now published. But for the immense amount of advertising carried by most of the secular papers and magazines, every one of them would "go broke" in less than six months.
