NEWSPAPER OWNED BY GERMAN MULTI-MILLIONAIRE MAKES PUBLIC ITS OPINION.

LAYING ON OUR CREDULITY

France Is Given Indefinite Franchise to Continue Devastation of the European Mainland.

Berlin.-Europe is being treated as negligible quantity at the Washingon conference, in the opinion of The Deutsche Aligemeine Zeitung, the organ of Hugo Stinnes, leading German financier. It sees evidence in the circumstances that curtailment of naval armaments have been given primary consideration, that the issue of land armaments is not causing the conference apprehension. This attitude of the confrees, says the newspaper, gives France an indefinite franchise to continue her devastation of the European mainland."

The speech of Premier Briand, outlining to the conference France's need for a large army, is characterized as "purely speculation in American sentinentality and credulity."

"It was an act of brayura on the part of the political, Premier Danzeuse." the newspaper declares, "and t would be an insult to M. Briand's intelligence to assume that he himself, believed a single word of that which he addressed to the delegates and the galleries."

The newspaper doubts whether Premier Briand's address impressed the experts of the conference in the same measure as it did the superficial onlookers.

Plans For New Labor Union. New York.—Plans for the forma-tion of the new federation of independent labor unions and groups to be known as the United Labor Council of America, in opposition to the American Federation of Labor, were announced here. The official call for a general convention in this city on January 7, 8 and 9 at which a permanent organization will be effected has been issued by a provisional executive committee and a number of local
