J. E. Sellars Refuses \$50 For Acre of Clover.

A few days ago J. E. Sellars a farmer of Alamance County, refused fifty dollars for red clever growing on one acre of land. Mr. Sellars has excellent prospects for ten acres of red clover this year. The same field was in clover two years ago, At that time he limed half the field with fairly good results. However, he used a grain drill for applying the lime and this machine failed to put out the material heavily enough. A visit kidneys. to another lime demonstration convinced him that he needed

pounds of acid phsphate with the clover seed. This time the clover was so good that it began to attract attention as soon as the wheat was off the field.

"Recently, a tobacco farmer driving by saw the clover. He stopped and offered Mr. Sellers fifty dollars for an acre of it, and said he would cut and handle the hay himself. This was a tempting offer. The crop had not cost over fifteen dollars an acre to produce: however, Mr. Sellers figured that while the hay might not be worth fifty dollors for feed, by selling it he would lose the manurial value as well as the feeding value. Mr. Sellers stated that he was making every effort to build up his land and in order to be successful he knew he must put everything possible into the soil, and take as little as possible away from it."

Corn Fed Hogs May Pay This Year

Reports show that farmers over the United States will plant more corn this seasontha n last which means cheap corn. The existing shortage of hogs indicates that hogs will be high; so, cheap corn fed to high priced hogs should prove a winning combination for Tarheel farmers, if they have saved and bred those brood sows according to recommendations man by the office of swine exten-

sion at State College.
W. W. Shay, swine extension specialist, states that corn-fed ogs will prove winners in North Carolina next September when hogs as a rule are highest in this

"Take ten pigs weighing 35 lbs. each on May first," says Mr. Shay 'put them on a pasture of at least one acre to one and one-half a cres and give them a self-feeder plentifully supplied with shelled corn, fish meal and a mineral mixture See that water and shade are provided. Plant enough land to provide 521 bushe's of early maturing corn for these pigs. Turn them on this corn, which in eastern Carolina should be ready between July 15 and August 1. Move the self feeder over too but take out the corn leaving only the fish meal and minerals. Now sell the pigs around September 15 when they will have a weight of about 200 pounds each."

If handled in this way, Mr. Shay states that these pigs will return a profit of \$134.52, or figuring it cost 75 cents per bushel to produce corn, a profit of \$1.39 will be made on each bushel of corn fed. This, he states, is better than atbe Foul Typhoid Fever. The vactempting to sell corn at 80 cents or one dollar per bushel when it costs 75 cents to grow it.

"If 25 percent of the prospective corn crop of North Carolina were, handled in this way this year,,' says Mr. Shay, "the profits to the farmers of the State would be in: creased ten million dollars."

ccessful Milk Campaigns

Nearly every school child in Nash, Edgecombe and Wayne counties was given an opportunity to know the good effects of drinking milk in three intensive campaigns recently held in these counties by workers of the home demonstration division cooperating with the dairy extension

specialists of State College.

The campaigns were conducted, as a part of the nutrition work of the home demonstration division with Mrs. Effie Vines Gordon in charge of the campaign in Nash, Miss Dorothy Dean in Edgecombe and Miss Janie Roberts in Wayne. Mrs Estelle T Smith, district agent, assisted in planning, organ-izing and conducting the work.

The workers began some three weeks before time for the campaign in organizing the club women to help conduct the work On the dates set, merchants put in attractive window displays, the local papers gave the movement editorial and news support and the club women set about spreading the gospel of better health by drinking milk. At the close of the days set apart for the work, all those engaged met in the office of the home agent at a dinner and reported.

In Nash county 60 workers reached 5,002 children in the schools of the county and at Rocky Mount. In Edgecombe county, 26 speakers reached 2,546 children and equally as good results were secured in Wayne, though actual figures are not available.

Commenting on this work, Miss Maude Wallace who had the campaigns in charge stated that one dairyman said his sales of milk had increased 30 quarts per day two days after the meetings clos-ed. The dairyman of Wayne noticed a remarkable increase and reported that they would have to buy more cows if the demand continued to increase. Better than all else, said Miss Wallace, the young folks who have been drinking coffee now know the value of a glass of milk which means more health and happiness in the homes touched.
