## Standard Training School at M. E. Church May 20-25.

Beginning Sunday, May 20, and closing on Friday, 25th, a Standard Training School will be conducted at the Graham M. E. church for Sunday school and church leaders. The motto of the school is: “Take time for training, for training takes time.”

The classes will begin work at 3 o'clock p. m. on the opening day and there will be two periods of 50 minutes each.

The schedule from Monday evening till Friday evening will be as follows:

7:30 to 8:20—First class period.  
8:20 to 8:40—Intermission—worship.

8:40 to 9:20—Second class period.

Certificates and awards will be given those who attend regularly and apply themselves to the subjects embraced in the course of study.

“The Sunday School” topic has been assigned to Prof. B. G. Childs of Duke University. He will tell of the relation of the Sunday school to the church.

The “Bible” is the subject to be handled by Prof. H. E. Myers of Duke University, who was at one time pastor of the Graham church and is pleasantly remembered.

Miss Georgia Keene is the elementary superintendent and will stress this work in the small Sunday school. Her work will be directed to the primary department, the cradle roll and beginners.

Miss Edna Williams of Greensboro will devote her efforts to the unit composed of pupils from 12 to 17 years of age and denominated “intermediate senior administration.”

There is a place in the course of study for everyone in any way interested in the Sunday school work.

The school will be supervised by a board of managers, the officers of which are: Rev. A. C. Holler, chairman; L. C. Allen, secretary; L. L. Gobel, director; Rev. J. C. Wooten, Presiding Elder.

There are several committees, covering the needs of the school as to enrollment and literature, finances, entertainment, publicity and arrangement.
