Weather of All Sorts Inside a Week.

Last week closed with as mild weather as anyone could wish for the time of year in this latitude. Sunday was balmy, but the band began to play Sunday evening.

By Monday morning the mercury had taken a plunge between 50 and 60 degrees, but did not stop at that. King Winter galloped over the country from Canada to Florida. It was more than 40 below in the Northwest; in the Northeast it was as low as 20; near-zero weather prevailed in many points in Dixie.

Reports from some points in this State say it was the coldest since '31.

In the North, Middle West and West many people lost their lives from the severe cold, and much farm stock was frozen to death.

Here it was bitter cold Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, but on the last named there was some evidence of moderation. Many took note of thermometer readings—from zero up to seven.

As a sort of finale, sometime during last night, between midnight and dawn, it snowed and this was followed by rain. To early risers the only evidence of it having snowed was a little slush.

And today, up to this writing, it is raining most of the time.

It has been a spell of real old time winter weather most of us will readily agree.

Dr. J. U. Newman's Home Burned at Elon College.

On Wednesday afternoon between 3 and 4 o'clock, the residence of Dr. J. U. Newman at Elon College, caught on fire and was completely burned up.

Almost the entire family was at home and unaware that the house was burning over their heads until an alarm was given. All possible help was rendered. Only a portion of the furnishings down stairs was saved. The greatest loss was Dr. Newman's fine library which he had accumulated during a lifetime. He has the sympathy of many friends in his serious loss.

The Burlington firemen were called, but it was too late to do anything toward saving the home and the contents.
