Marriage Permits for 1934 Show Large Increase Over 1933

The marriage license records in the office of J. G. Tingin, Register of Deeds, show a large increase in 1934 over the previous year, about 43 percent. In 1934 the total number issued was 536, 391 white and 145 colored, in 1933 total 374; 267 white, 107 colored, and for December, 1934, 68; December, 1933, 87. In June and December, last year, exactly the same number, 48, were issued to whites.

The Legislature of 1933 repealed the health clause for marriage permits, which went into effect on June 1st of that year, and that is reflected in the number of permits issued. For 1934 the number of both white and colored were nearly three times the number for the same period in 1933, from January 1st to June 1st. Perhaps another element had something to do with the increase, the country had started on the way to recovery.

For the years the health requirement was in effect hundreds of couples went to border States to be married and they will continue to do that but not in such large numbers, and the counties lost thousands in revenues from marriage licenses on account of couples going away to be married.

Last Monday morning Mrs. J. Harvey White received a message from Charlotte advising her of the death of her brother, James V. Pomeroy, and she and Mr. White and their nieces, Misses Cornelia and Elizabeth Pomeroy, immediately left for the Charlotte home. The funeral service was held at the home in Charlotte Tuesday morning and the body was brought here and interred in the family plot in Linwood cemetery Tuesday afternoon.

Mr. Pomeroy was 60 years of age and was a son of the late Major James Voorhees Pomeroy and Mrs. Cornelia Doolittle Pomeroy, formerly of Utica, N. Y. Mr. Pomeroy is survived by his wife, now an invalid, who was Miss Edythe Gilchrist of Ardmore, Pa., a sister, Mrs. J. Harvey White of Graham, a half sister, Mrs. Carrie Zinkeisen of Brooklyn, N. Y., and two nieces, above mentioned, the daughters of a deceased brother, Theo. O. Pomeroy, and a nephew, James White.

The Pomeroy's came here to make their home in 1886, Maj. Pomeroy having come here to engage in the cotton milling business at Big Falls, four miles north of Graham. James spent his young manhood days here, one time in business here, but had lived in Charlotte for the past twelve years. He was a fine citizen, good business man and had a host of friends who deeply deplore his death. His last illness was for only two days from angina, from which he had suffered for two or more years. In the early part of December he spent several days here with his sister, called on old friends, was jovial and appeared to be in good health.

James C. McAdams, who has operated a 5-10c store for the past several years, has sold out and quit.

His record in closing out is very unusual. During the holiday trading season he sold everything he had in stock except \$43's worth which he sold to Morris, his next-door neighbor. That's not all the story: When he closed he owed nobody anything and nobody owed him anything. A record, that!

Several years ago he bought Mac's 5c-10c store (the sign is still over the door), the first store of the kind, full stocked, that opened in Graham that was starting for the rocks, so reported.

It is no every-day accomplishment to take up a losing business, as did Mr. McAdams, run it for several years, then close completely out free of debt for or against.

Junius H. Harden and E. L. Henderson Awarded Judgment in Large Amount.

The first of this week, Judge Johnson J. Hayes of the U. S. District Court, handed down a judgment for more than \$52,000 in favor of Messrs. Harden and Henderson against the American Service Company. It grew out of a default by the company for certain refrigerating properties. The litigation has been long and tedious. Plaintiffs were represented by Hon. W. H. Carroll of Burlington and Maj. J. J. Henderson of Graham.
