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PRETTY GOOD GUESSWORK

Everybody is speculating on how the defeat of Germany will come about. One able authority states the belief that the German war will end in the gradual disintegration of the forces of that country and "not in sudden surrender." It could be; it could be so! But there are a number of thoes big boys, Hitler included, who are scheduled to be hung, shot or otherwise "disintegrated" and that ceremony cannot be closed up "gradually." Some folks say that he should be "left to Stalin, who would know how to disintegrate" the big stiff.

Of course Hitler knows that he is beaten, and that is explained by the wise-boy to blame for this item as the reason why Hitler is "determined to create as much chaos in Europe as possible. That shows why "Hitler is acting in this stage as a pure revolutionary."

PATTERNS FOR PEACE

The Dumbarton Oakes Conference produced substantial agreements among the United Nations. The Mexican Conference has put some improvements on the Dumbarton Charter. The two conferences have rounded out the agreements made by Roosevelt, Churchill and Stalin. All this "spadework" has been supplemented by discussions and debates in the United States Congress and the British Parliament. The next step towards making a pattern for World Peace will be the gathering of representatives from the United Nations at San Francisco on April 25, he support pledged to Roosevelt by our Congress, and to Churchill by his Parliament, is most encouraging. Both these heads of Governments have vouched approval of Stalin, and that has gone a very long ways towards clearing up doubts about Russia playing fair and coming through with a form of peace that will allay the suspicions of skeptical millions of people in the leading countries of the World.

It is most important to note the almost universal approval that backs the Big Three. They are given credit for having laid the foundations for lasting peace. We all hope for the end wars through successful agreements by the United Nations. Judged from our experiences in the past it looks though civilization can be and will—saved from future World Wars. Anyway, we are on the right track.



The Approach

Planned Economy was advocated in Germany by a small group of theorists as long ago as 1880. The large mass of politically minded Germans considered them harmless cranks and toyed with their ideas abstractedly for all of ten years before they saw danger in them. People who were loyal to the old Germany and its ways learned suddenly that Planned Economy was gaining popularity.

Serious consideration of Planned Economy started among conservative thinkers in Germany about half a century ago. Deliberate, Teutonic minds almost universally opposed the thought of manhandling economic laws which they recognized as natural laws, worthy of respect in any orderly society. Just the same, they saw in Planned Economy a powerful tool for rough work.

Something Different. Fifteen or 20 years passed without much outward change. Planned Economy was still in the background. Everybody seemed conscious of it. More and more people admitted believing that parliaments had a right to enact written laws against the workings of competition as they understood it. In fact, every time a German became dissatisfied with conditions he thought about Planned Economy.

Finally 1914 came, bringing World War I. Germany quickly went all out for Planned Economy. It was a shrewd political move. People reasoned feebly that open competition must cost something, and accepted the new order in the name of efficiency; to win the war. All industry went hurriedly under government control, and the dreams of yesterday's unpopular minority became the rule.

Monopolies Thrived. Government managers eliminated new and growing industrial plants. Huge monopolies grew larger still. It was the easy way for government because a few big concerns are less trouble to manage than a large number of small ones. Competitors entered into cartels to hike prices and hide incompetence. They divided markets like pies and traded customers as if they were sheep.

Defeated in World War I, burdened with reparations, lame of manpower, Germany took a still bigger dose of government control. By 1935 Hitler was dictating to a race of conservatives who could still remember laughing at the economic planners and saying, "It can't happen here." Planned Economy had given way to National Socialism; in other words, plain dictatorship.

Like a Drug Habit. We have Planned Economy in America now, a powerful weapon for rough work such as we are doing. But Planned Economy is still a habit-forming medicine. If America is to be prosperous again, this drug must be used sparingly. Rationing is effective if it's necessary, poisonous if it's not. Rationing, in its only safe form, is held to an irreducible minimum—not taken for effect. America's defenders and her allies must be fed. Also must the people at home understand that their government is still a power that's friendly to them. Returning now to the easy rationing rules of last September and October would yield more support voluntarily than Hitler himself could get with his three-speed machine: (1) Planned Economy, (2) Regimentation, (3) Dictatorship.

Blue X5, Y5, A2, B2, now valid expire March 31. C2, D2, E2, G2, now valid expire April 28. H2, J2, K2, L2, M2, now valid expire June 2. N2, O2, P2, R2, S2, now valid, expire June 30.

MEATS & FATS

Red Q5, R5, S5, now valid expire March 31. T5, U5, V5, W5, X5, now valid expire April 28. Y5, Z5, A2, B2, C2, D2, now valid expire June 2. E2, F, G2, H2, J2, now valid, expire June 30.

SUGAR

Sugar Stamp No. 34 good for five pounds expires Feb. 28. Sugar Stamp No. 35 good for five pounds expires June 2.

SHOES

Airplane Stamps No. 1, 2, and 3 now good.

FUEL OIL

Period 4 and 5 coupons from last season, Periods 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 from this season all valid for 10 gallons each.

GASOLINE

A-14 coupons valid through March 21.

RENT CONTROL

All persons renting, or offering for rent, any living quarters whatsoever must register each dwelling unit with rent control office in their rent area. Persons who feel that they are being over-charged for rents may sub-

mit complaints to OPA. Complaint forms are available at the local War Price and Rationing Board if your area does not have a rent control office.

Rationing rules now require that each car owner write his license number and State on each coupon in his possession as soon as it is issued to him by his local rationing board.

A good garden furnishes extra, fresh food; lots of blisters and sunburn and backaches; and down-right contentment.

Good fertility of hatching eggs may be obtained 7 days after mating and for about 7 days after males are removed from the poultry flock at the end of the breeding season.

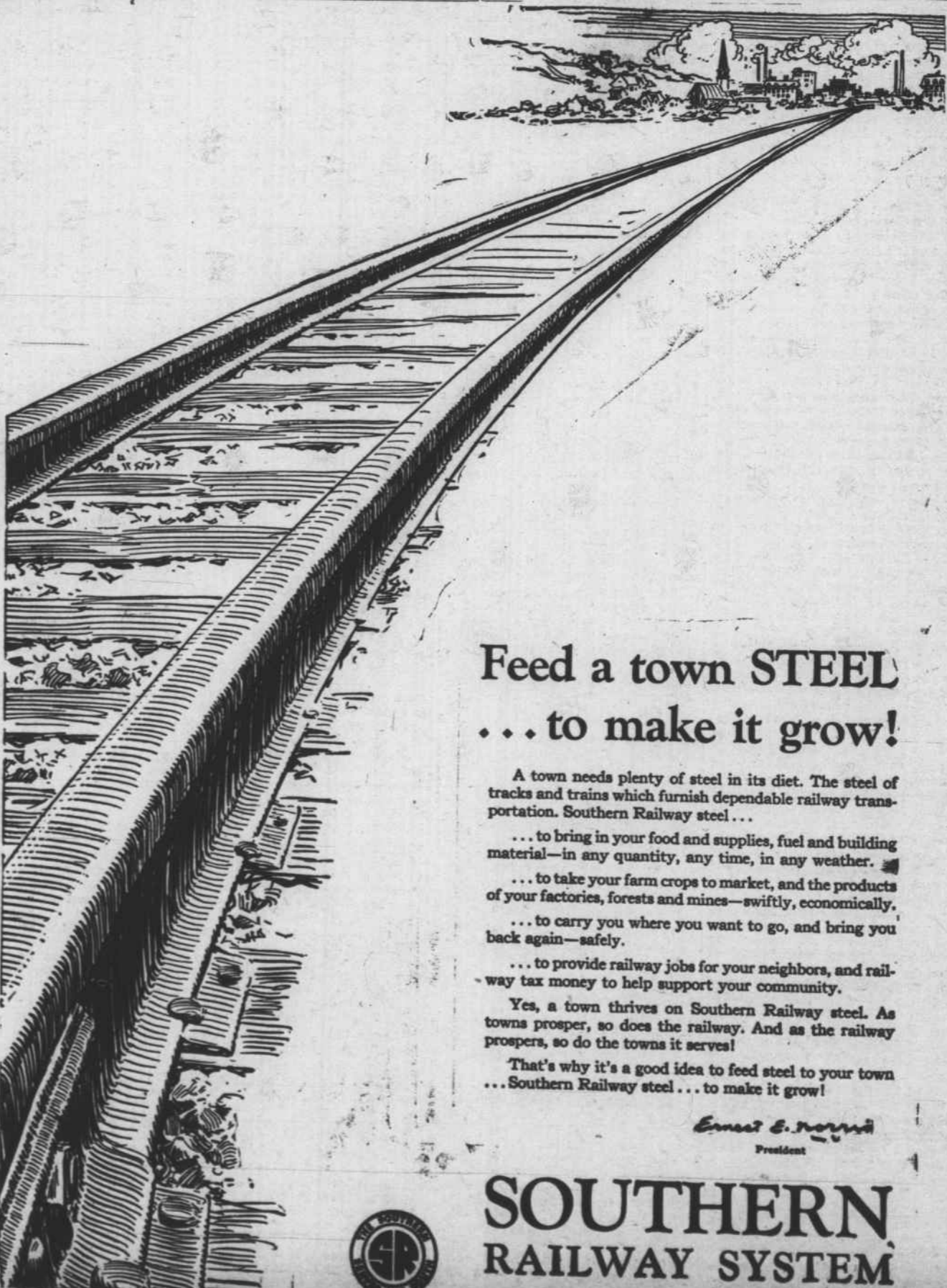
