In fact, a survey just completed across the by the Institute reveals that the majority of Americans want things to remain pretty much as they were before the war.

e head of the Institute told a few hopeful details about individual inswers to his questions. He says a good share of the minority for post-war changes want to change back, back to conditions we knew years before the war. He didn't say so, but indicated clearly that the people are longing for the days of self-reliance, before the WPA, the CCC and the NYA.

Burners Need Frequent Cleaning for Efficiency

Surface burners need regular, thorough cleaning. Take them out, brush away food or dust particles with a stiff brush. Use a brush also to clean the air shutter. If openings in the burners are clogged, use a fine wire to clean them. Beware of soothpicks; they may break and further clog the burner.

Clean cast-iron burners by boiling them for a short time in a solution of washing soda, one tablespoon to three quarts of water. Then wash in soap and water. Use a bottle brush to clean the inside of the tube leading to the burner head. Rinse the burners in clear water, and wipe dry. Put them upside down in the warm oven for a few minutes to dry thoroughly before replacing.

Burners of materials other than cast iron should not be boiled in soda water. A soap and water bath will usually clean them satisfac-torily, with the aid of a scratchless scouring powder and fine steel wool.
