Films Offered Schools

The schools of Alamance county which can obtain 16 mm projectors will be offered a selection of twelve musical-talkie films on forest fire prevention and selective cutting this Fall, it is stated in an announcement sent the Superintendent of Schools by the Southern States Forestfire Commission, Inc., with headquarters in Birmingham-5, Ala. The films are being offered by the U. S. Forestry Headquarters in Atlanta, and the American Forest Products Industries, Inc., Washington in cooperation with the Commission program in this area.

Included in the list of interesting free shows will be "Hell Roaring Nineties" with scenes of the Pacific Northwest when the lumber industry was begun.

Another film which shows why rayon cord made from wood fibre is stronger than cotton in automobile manufacture, will be offered the Commission bulletin states.

Calf Care

Calves should be kept in individual pens, where practical, until they are three to four months old. After reaching that age they may be housed in groups of two to four. Their pens should be kept dry, clean, and freshly bedded daily. Small calves should not be exposed directly to hot summer sun for long periods. A constant, fresh supply of water should be kept available to the calves. After the calf is four to six months old, it should have access to all the tender grazing it will take. Spring and early summer calves will need daily feeds of dry hay and sufficient grain to keep them in growing condition through their first year. Late summer and early fall calves should be ready to turn to pasture by late spring. However, they should be watched to make sure that they continue to

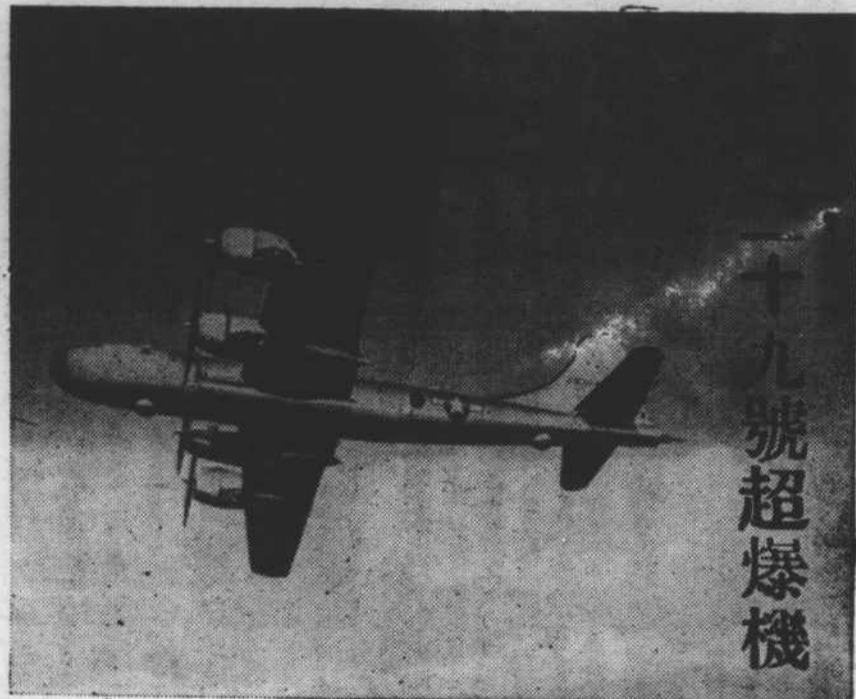
ADMINISTRATOR'S NOTICE

TOKYO KNEW ABOUT THE B-29 BEFORE YOU DID

Captured evidence reveals that the Japs knew the story six months before most Americans knew it existed



As far-away Burma, early in 1944—long before the B-29 became front-page news at home—long before our own forces in China and in India were notified to expect this great super-bomber—came news of its existence—uncomfortably accurate technical description—positive facts as to proposed bases... from the JAPS. Stores of precious gasoline—parts—and other scarce hard-to-get stores flown at great risk over the famous "Hump" were put to the torch. A terrific set-back—an almost unendurable discouragement.
