Local Funeral Home Changes Name and Personnel

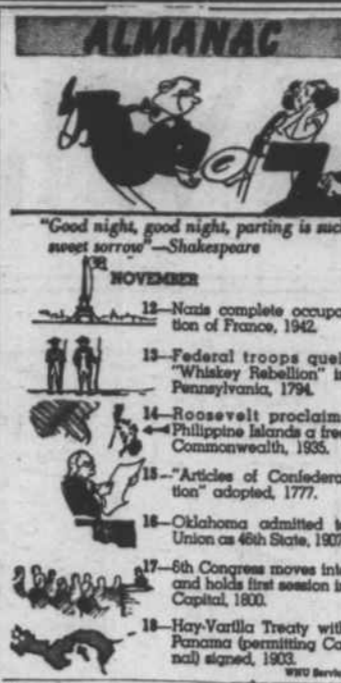
