Citizens and Teachers meet

Citizens and members of the Graham school faculty met Tuesday afternoon in the school auditorium.

The conferences are held for the purpose of adopting a definite teaching policy for the school, and to determine where certain faults exist in the present teaching methods.

During the meeting a committee of faculty members was appointed to draw up a general summary of all suggestions made by parents and teachers during the meetings.

Later on after a definite policy has been set up a result of the conferences, a study will be made by school officials to determine to what extent the teaching objectives are being carried out and just what group is being neglected.

The meeting was attended by approximately 50 citizens of the town and all members of the Graham school faculty.

Architect Named To Begin Plans For Public Hospital Building In The County

Eric G. Flannagan of Henderson has been appointed as architect to begin plans for the construction of a public hospital for Alamance county, according to Everette Jordan, hospital board chairman, following a recent meeting.

It was the first action on the proposed construction of a public hospital for the county since the authorization of a \$500,000 bond issue in a general election held December 4 for the purpose of financing the project.

During the meeting of the board of trustees, Chairman Jordan was authorized to contact Dr. W. S. Rankin, director of the Duke Endowment fund, on the possibility of securing a grant from the fund to aid in the hospital construction.

No definite decision has been announced by the board as to the selection of the site. It will be necessary, however, for a selection of the site to be made before actual blueprints can be drawn up and tendered to the board by the architect appointed for the construction.

Although the subject did not come up before the trustees at their recent meeting, it was believed that when the board made public the selection of the site for the construction of the hospital that an open hearing might be held in order that any objections to the site might be aired in public.
