I believe in specialization but I think no specialty should be so narrow as to exclude good citizenship. I believe in versatility, but how can any collection of misceNaneous knowledge be complete without some facts about how men became free to pursue knowledge and get understanding? No people can re-main free long after their youth cease to appreciate their sacred liberties.

Young Ideas. Within the last 12 months, I have been privileged to talk with the stu-dents of a great many high schools and colleges in widely scattered states. I have discussed private enterprise and state socialism with them, and I can testify that most of them seem to consider private enterprise a failure. Some of them have been extremely well coached to debate against it.

Questioning them sympathetical-ly, I find that very few of the students I meet have a clear idea about what private enterprise is. They consider it a system that gives spe-cial advantages to rich men and big corporations. They point out that our system has not maintained full ment, has not prevented alempl ternate has neger equalized living standards.


HIGHLIGHTS OF REGULAR ARMY ENLISTMENT

1. Enlistments for 1½, 2 or 3 years. (1-year enlistments permitted for men now in the Army with 6 or more months of service.) 2. Enlistment sge from 18 to 34 years inclusive (17 with parents' consent) except for men now in Army, who may reenlist at any age, and former service men depending on length of service.

A resultant to surve.
A resultant bonus of \$50 for each year of active service since such bonus was last paid, or since last entry into service, provided resultst-ment is within 3 months after last honorable discharge.

4. A furlough for men who re within 20 days. Full details of furlough privileges can be obt from Recruiting Officers. 5. Mustering-out pay (based upon length of service) to all men who are discharged to enlist or reenlist 6. Option to retire at half pay for the rest of your life after 20 years' service-increasing to three-quarters pay after 30 years' service. All pre-vious active federal military service counts toward retirement.

7. Choice of branch of service and overseas theater (of those still open) on 3-year enlistments.


