We can't help but believe that Senators Aldrich and Hale thought it best to get out before they would have to.

The best thing that will happen in a number of years for the government is the possible resignation of Senators Aldrich and Hale.

The news of Aldrich and Hale's possible resignations as United States Senators was welcomed by many of the citizens of the United States. The only improvement upon the action as seen by the laboring people, is that Aldrich's resignation did not take effect before the present tariff bill was formed.

AND now a Republican plurality of 6,000 is converted into a Democratic majority of about 4,000 at Rochester, N. Y. George W. Aldridge, the local Republican Boss and a legislative boodler, doubtless contributed something to this result by running as the republican candidate but the chief influences must have been national. Else why has every by-election for some time shown the same powerful Democratic tendency? —Charlotte Observer.

**ALDRIDGE IS REJECTED.**

By a majority of 6,000 votes James S. Havens, Democrat, lawyer of marked ability and man of unimpeachable character, was elected to Congress from Monroe county, N. Y., yesterday, over George W. Aldridge, Republican, boss of the Monroe county machine, who is more or less involved in the fire insurance scandal at Albany.

That majority of 5,000 should spell the growing demand for public officials of high character who will serve the people faithfully. The victory of Havens, a Democrat, may have read into it the sign that this is the day of the Democrats. More rightly can it be taken as the protest of the people against unworthy candidates who are thrust upon them.

A striking contrast is furnished between this Democratic majority and the great Republican victories of the late James B. Perkins, of Rochester. Perkins was reelected to the Sixty-first Congress by a vote of 33,025 votes to the 22,858 cast for the Democratic candidate, having a majority of more than 7,000 of all votes cast for the different candidates.

The 6,000 majority for Havens was made up of Republican as well as Democratic votes. Aldridge selected himself as a candidate, and the principal part of his campaign consisted in demands for the payment of political debts. It is probable that such Republicans and such Democrats as owed debts to Aldridge paid him back with their votes. The majority of voters, however, proved their independence by voting for Havens.

The voters are the only bosses whose power is certain.—Washington Post.
