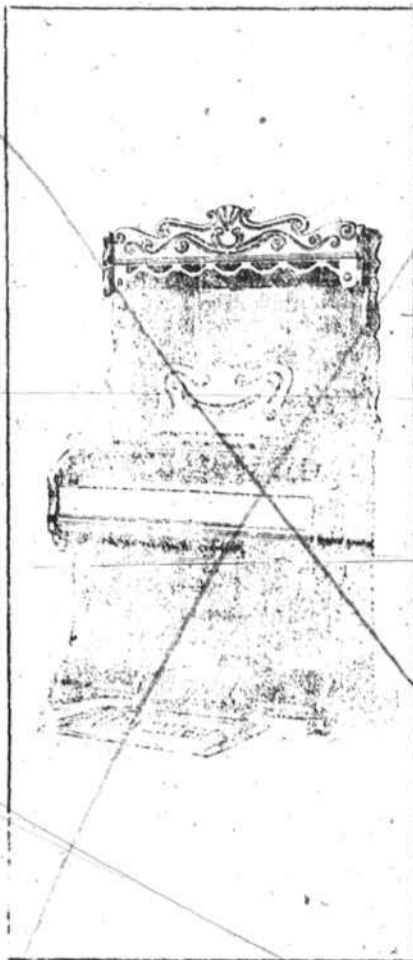

### Feed The Cow All She Can Utilize.

The reason for this is that usually about fifty per cent of all the food that a cow consumes is required for her maintenance. The other half goes to form milk. When we withhold one-fourth of the full allowance of feed for a cow we are supplying only one-half the amount of feed which is actually required for the production of milk. Yet I think that it is safe to say that at least nine-tenths of our dairymen and farmers fail to supply the final quarter of the cow's ration. Always feed a cow to her full capacity, and this means to supply feed as long as there is an economical response in milk. Of course, it would be perfectly useless to feed a cow whose milk production is limited to two gallons per day a 4-gallon ration, because the feed for the two gallons would be wasted.—John Michels, in Raleigh (N. C.) Progressive Farmer and Gazette.
