An Act Regulating The Rate of Speed And Signals of Automobiles etc.

It shall be unlawful for any person to drive an automobile, auto-buggy, moto-cycle or any other carriage or vehicle by what so ever name called propelled by steam, generated by gas, gasoline, coal oil or any other substance at a greater rate of speed in the Town of Franklinton than 10 miles per. hour, and each and every person driving such machine or vehicle shall sound a gong, bell or horn or give some warning signal at every street crossing and intersecting street in said town of Franklinton sufficiently loud to be heard 100 yards in advance of approaching corner and ring or blow continually until corner or street crossing is passed. It further enacted that the rate of speed shall be reduced to 10 miles per. hour while crossing any street or turning any street corner in the town of Franklinton, also the signal lights shall be observed which is required by state. Any person violating this ordinance or section or any part thereof shall be fined not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$20.00 for each offense. Passed by Board in regular session Monday night Dec. 2nd, 1911.
