The Chicago packers are making a vigorous fight against the anti-trust law on the ground that it is unconstitutional.

The Republican graft gang of Boss Cox "goes to smash" is the news from Cincinnati, and the reform wave has only half run its course.

The total cash reserves of all the National Banks average 21.67 per cent. They hold \$1,434,269,545, or \$95,604,495 above the legal requirement.

PRESIDENT TAFT is now reported to have confided to the stalwart Senators that the army "maneuvers" was "primarily a political one as regards Mexico." What?

The Smithsonian Institute reports that it is to embark in the weather predicting business. Well, it can't do much worse than the weather bureau has averaged.

NEVADA has made divorce so easy that Reno hotels and boarding houses cannot accommodate the crowd that is intent on casting off the old love preparatory to taking on the new.

The iron and steel trade is accounted the barometer of business. The steel trust has 72 per cent. of its blast furnaces active, which is a gain of 12 per cent over last month, so we may conclude the business in other lines is improving.

The difficult problem in enacting a tariff for revenue is to find the rate of duty that will produce the most revenue and at the same time bring about enough competition from abroad to prevent exorbitant prices at home.

The United States Circuit Court of Appeals has granted a permanent injunction restraining the corporation commission of Oklahoma from enforcing the 2-cent passenger rate on the seven railroads in that state on the ground that the rate is confiscatory.

Don't forget that the high cost of living and other troubles of like nature can rightfully be blamed on the Republican party until the Democrats have had time to reform the tariff and cut down expenses, which they will do if a Republican Senate and a Republican President do not stand in the way.

T. R. HAS fired another shot at the mucky-raking magazines, but he distinguishes between those that have done "a splendid public service" and others which he terms "Ananias muckrakers." The Colonel is warming up again as though he might be an independent candidate for president.

The Lorimer case is not yet settled, as far as the fact of the use of money in his election as Senator from Illinois is concerned; for H. H. Kohlsaat, publisher of the Chicago Record-Herald, told the State Senate Investigating Committee that "he knew \$10,000 had been used to procure the election of Lorimer." He refused to give the committee the source of his information which he declared would violate a confidence.

AMERICAN shoe manufacturers do not fear the threatened competition of English shoe manufacturers. They declare that "the English shoe manufacturers would find it very hard to compete with us after paying the 10 per cent tariff duty." It is evident, therefore, that the duty on shoes is just where it should be, for it allows limited competition, and will thus in time tend to keep down any attempt to increase the prices here. It is, therefore, a test of what is called a tariff for revenue.

Notice is hereby given that, in accordance with the provisions of an act of the General Assembly of North Carolina, public laws of 1911, entitled an act to provide good roads in Lonsburg township, Franklin county, ratified the 7th day of March, 1911, and upon the request of the Board of Road Trustees of Lonsburg township, represented by W. H. Allen and C. B. Cheatham, committee. The board of commissioners for the county of Franklin do hereby order an election to be held on Wednesday, the 10th day of May, 1911, at which election there shall be submitted to the voters of Lonsburg township the question of the levy of a special tax and issuing of the bonds as set out and provided in said act of 1911, section thirteen, at a rate not exceeding 25c on the \$100 worth of property and 75c on the poll. John H. Best, appointed Registrar and J. M. Allen and E. S. Ford are appointed poll holders for said election. The voting place will be at the court house, in the usual place provided for holding elections for county and state officers, in the town of Lonsburg, and the same shall be held and conducted as is provided in the aforesaid act of 1911, a copy of which is filed with the board. A new registration is provided for in said act and the registration books will be kept open for such purpose in the office of the Registrar of Deeds of Franklin county for the time provided by law. Those electors in favor of the issuance of said bonds shall cast ballot upon which shall be written or printed "For Good Roads" and those opposed to the issuance of said bonds and the levy of said tax shall cast ballot upon which shall be written or printed "Against Good Roads." 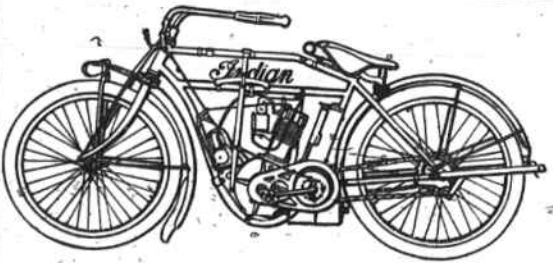
