

A Card To The Voters of Louisburg Township.

Under the Road Law of 1899 there was regularly levied an annual tax of 25 cents on the \$100 worth of property and 75 cents on the poll in Louisburg Township for improvement of the Public Roads, and such tax, amounting to between \$3250.00 and \$3600.00 annually has been levied and expended since that time; and the results are apparent to all. Our roads do not compare favorably at all with those of adjoining townships built with the money in hand and under improved and more modern methods although in the ten or more years working under this system we have spent more money, but the trouble lies not in the waste of funds but in the attempt to build the roads a little at a time and according to the funds in hand each year. It has been demonstrated that good roads cannot be built piece meal; and we therefore procured a bill to enable you to sell bonds and have funds in hand with which to buy teams and machinery sufficient to build the roads according to the best and most improved methods. This bill does not increase the tax levy—in fact by its terms it cannot do so, and unless the majority of the voters choose to change the method of levying the tax by issuance of bonds the old tax levy of 25 cents on the \$100 stands indefinitely on us. The old and present system of taxation is not disturbed by the bond election unless bonds are voted for; and if bonds are voted for, the old levy will be annulled and the levy made for bonds which cannot in any event exceed the levy, as now fixed, of 25 cents on the \$100. In fact the Board is confident that bonds can be successfully floated and matured on a levy less than 25 cents on the \$100. Even under present valuations which valuations may be reasonably expected to increase, if not at once under the new system of taxation under general law, certainly as the years pass by.

We therefore urge the voters to come to the polls on May 10th and give a large majority for bonds and enable us to get in line with progressive and successful road builders, assuring them that their burdens cannot and will not be increased but lessened, if possible, under taxes to float bonds.

NOTICE OF ELECTION.

Notice is hereby given that, in accordance with the provisions of an Act of the General Assembly of North Carolina, Public Laws of 1911, entitled "An Act to provide for the issuing of bonds by the Town of Louisburg," adopted at the session of 1911, the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Louisburg do hereby order an election to be held on Tuesday, the second day of May, 1911, at which election there shall be submitted to the voters of the Town of Louisburg the question of the levy of a special tax not exceeding ten cents on the \$100.00 worth of property and thirty cents on the poll, and the issuance of bonds not exceeding \$15,000.00, as set out and provided in said Act of 1911, a copy of which is on file with the Clerk of the Board. The proceeds of said bonds to go to the discharge of the floating indebtedness of the town.

The same registrar and pollholders appointed to hold the regular biennial election of officers, namely R. O. Bissett, Registrar, and E. F. Yarborough and A. F. Johnson, pollholders will hold said election.

The voting place shall be in the Town of Louisburg at the place selected for the election of town officers upon that date, and the same shall be held and conducted as is provided in the aforesaid Act of 1911. No new registration is required but all qualified voters of the Town of Louisburg are entitled to vote in said election. Those voting for the issue of said bonds shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words, "For Bonds" and those voting against the same shall have written or printed thereon the words, "Against Bonds."

The registration books will be kept open in the office of the Town Clerk at Hill's Stables on Nash street for the time required by law, and those who have become qualified to vote in said town since the last election or who were qualified at that time but did not register are notified to register for said election.
