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MAY 14TH, 1911.

Isaiah's Vision and Call to Service. (Home Missionary Lesson) Isa. vi.

Golden text—I heard the voice of the Lord, saying, Whom shall I send, and who will go for us? Then said I, here am I, send me, Isa. vi:8.

(1.) Verses 1-4—Who did God give this vision to Isaiah?

(2.) Do you think that any such vision needs repeating?

(3.) When we have a special Divine illumination which has the advantage of connecting it with some event, pointing down the way, as Isaiah seems to have done?

(4.) Did Isaiah or any other seer ever see with the outward senses the actual real God, and was it ever so seen?

(5.) Is there any reason to think that Seraphim, or angels, are everywhere in the universe? Have had to see through what these them?

(6.) Verse 5—How was it that the sight of the Lord made Isaiah conscious of his sinfulness?

(7.) What if any reason is there to conclude that the use of coarse slang, or profanity, proves a man to be an impure man?

(8.) Which is the more effectual way to reveal to sinners their guilt, to correct them with words, or to live pure lives before them? Why?

(9.) What effect does the teaching of the spotless purity of Jesus have, upon sinful men?

(10.) Verses 6-7—What is God's attitude to sinners who are conscious of, and loathe themselves because of their sins?

(11.) What is the "live coal," with which the Seraphim touched the lips of Isaiah, emblematic of?

(12.) What actually transpires in a man's spiritual nature, when he comes to God for the pardon of his sins?

(13.) What reason is there to think that angels, or spirits have anything to do with the salvation, or the spiritual comfort of men and women today?

(14.) Verse 8—What class of men and women does God need, and call to be missionaries?

(15.) What are the indications that God is calling to-day, with a loud voice, for missionaries? (This is one of the questions which may be answered in writing by members of the club.)

(16.) Is it possible for any person to be in harmony with God who is not willing to be a missionary, or to support a missionary, if the Lord should so demand?

(17.) What reasons are there to conclude that is the duty of pastors in these days, to look out for suitable young men, and call them to missionary work?

(18.) Verses 9-10—The prophet was being sent to a people familiar with God's message, and hardened in sin; what is generally the doom of such people?

(19.) What is the use of continuing to preach to a gospel hardened people?

(20.) When sinners hear the call of God to repentance, and heed it not, what change takes place in them, for better or worse?

(21.) Verses 11-13—It is very trying to preach without results, but is there anything in this story to indicate that in time, a faithful servant of God will surely cause some to hear and turn to the Lord?

WEEVIL BEATEN BY EARLY CROP

Expert Advises on Way to Avoid Damage to Cotton.

FERTILIZERS ARE VALUABLE.

Every Possible Means Should Be Adopted For Forcing the Plants So That There Will Be No Food Late In Season For the Pests—Early Varieties Should Be Chosen.

FACTS CONCERNING THE BOLL WEEVIL.

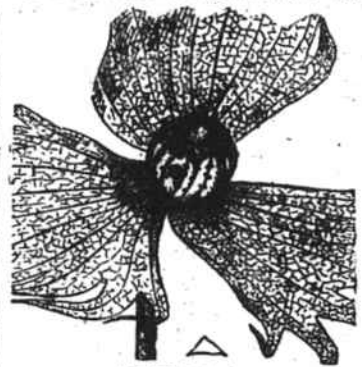
IT came from Mexico and first appeared in southern Texas in 1892. It spread to half a dozen counties by 1894, when government attention was directed to it. States now affected—Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Arkansas and Oklahoma. Area affected, about 225,000 square miles. Loss to planters, 400,000 bales annually. Since its advent the boll weevil has destroyed 2,550,000 bales, worth \$125,000,000.

Although the destruction of the weevils in the fall is the great essential step in controlling the insect, it cannot be depended on exclusively. The full benefits of the fall work and the maximum crop cannot be obtained unless the next great step, procuring an early crop, is also taken.

The advantage of early planting has been demonstrated in every one of the numerous experiments made by the bureau of entomology and has now become the general practice among farmers. The reasons for the efficiency of early planting are not far to seek. The small numbers of weevils passing through the winter must have considerable time to multiply. They are unable to breed until squares are put on by the plants, since the food obtained from the fruit is required before reproduction can begin.

Advantage in Early Planting. Moreover, at the time the first squares are put on, the development of the immature stages is comparatively slow, not reaching the very rapid rate that obtains during the warm days and nights of the summer. For

these reasons it is possible for the farmer to rush his crop in such a way that a large number of squares and bolls will be formed before the weevils have multiplied to a serious extent.

Of course under usual conditions the weevils will ultimately multiply so that the crop put on after a certain date will all be destroyed. This, however, is of no importance since a top crop in weevil regions is entirely out of the question.

Use of Commercial Fertilizers.

An important step in procuring an early crop under many conditions is the use of commercial fertilizers. In many large areas in the cotton belt the land is not impoverished to the extent that it actually needs fertilizers under normal conditions. It has been demonstrated many times by the different experiment stations in the south that the maturity of cotton can frequently be hastened materially by the use of fertilizers, especially those containing a high percentage of phosphoric acid.

The recommendation for the use of fertilizers in weevil regions, therefore, does not imply the exhaustion of the soil. It merely means that fertilizers are an important means of averting damage by the boll weevil.

Use of Early Varieties.

Next in importance, to early preparation and fertilization (where necessary) in obtaining an early crop of cotton comes the use of early varieties. In all experiments that have been undertaken the advantage in the use of early varieties has been conspicuous.

There are a number of standard varieties that have been found of value in weevil infested regions. Among them are the Rowden, Triumph, Cleveland Big Boll, Cook's Improved and King. All of these except the King have either medium sized or large bolls. The King has a small boll, about eight being required to make a pound, but is remarkably early and has given the best yields in most of the experiments of the bureau of entomology. Hawkins' Early Profile and Simpkins have given good results in recent experiments.
