The Crime of Arson.

Arson is a crime, and the person who commits it should be pupished just the same as the horse theif and the murderer. The man who fires a building, either his own or his neighbor's does so without any guarantee that he will not cause loss if life either in con nection with the fire in the build ing he aims to burn, or in an adjoining building. The crime of arson is a difficult one to fasten on a person, no matter how guilty he may be, for the evidence must be largely circumstantial, because no one is present for witnesses. The fact proves a stumbling block in the way of bringing incendaries to justice. There is a strong sentiment against the murderer the horse theif and the violator of the prohibitory law, but the "fire-bug" is looked upon as a myth in many quarters and is regarded too often as a subterfuge manufactured by the insurance company to keep from having to pay the insurance policy. And the incendiary, instead of getting his just dues, gets sympathy in his battle with the company or with the State authority who investigates the fire.

The person who commits arson has many advantages. He usually operates in his own home or place of business and can choose his own time and place for setting the fire. He can also prepare an alibi in advance and can prove that he was nowhere near when the fire was discovered. If the fire is successful, from the point of view of the property owner, the evidence burns up and there is nothing left but suspicious circumstances
