PUBLIC SCHOOL NOTES

A Weekly Column Devoted to the Interests of the Public School System of Franklin County.

1. The Reading Circle Examination will be held Saturday March 30th.
2. If for any providential reason a pupil cannot take the seventh grade examination on the 28th and 29th he will be given the opportunity to do so in the fall. Do not ask for special examination in the spring.
3. Have you a War Saving Society in each of your rooms? It takes only ten pupils to form a society. There are only three things required of a member: (a) To save his money. (b) To buy war saving stamps or thrift stamps. (c) To try to get others to join the society. If a member wishes he may become an officer in the war savings campaign and the government will give to him a badge designating his rank. For illustration: If a member secures ten members he becomes a soldier of war saving and the government gives to him a badge with one star; if he secures 25 members he becomes a captain of war savings and he receives a badge with two stars; for 50 members he becomes a Major of war savings and receives a badge with three stars; for 100 members he becomes a Colonel of war savings and receives a badge with four stars and for 200 members he becomes a General of war savings and receives a badge with five stars. It is not necessary however to try for an officer's place to become a member of a society; this is discretionary entirely with the members. The organization is simply ten or more people who pledge themselves to save what money they can to buy war saving stamps or thrift stamps and to try to get others to join the society. Principals and teachers are urgently requested to organize a society in each room if they have not already done so. When these societies have been organized have regular meetings once each week; at these meetings have a definite program and make it as attractive as possible. Ask the people in the community to attend these meetings. Schools that have more than one society and there should be one for each room, might have all of the societies in the school to meet together in the weekly meetings. Be sure to have as a part of the program a report from each society as to the number of stamps bought. Please refer to the letter I sent you two weeks ago concerning suggestions for keeping the work up during vacation. Pamphlets on organizing war saving societies were sent each school also but if you need further help call on me and I will go or send some one, day or night. Teachers do not lose this opportunity of teaching your pupils this lesson of saving and serving; remember you will also be taking a great part in the great world conflict. Take sufficient time from the school hours for this work. Please send to me as often as possible any special work your societies are doing.

4. Three war saving societies were organized in the Seven Paths School last Thursday.

5. Last Thursday the pupils in each room of the Justice High school voted unanimously to organize a war saving society. This will mean 6 societies for the Justice school.

6. Last Thursday a war saving society was organized in the Wilder school with 26 members.

7. The following comes from the Franklinton Graded School: "The result of the first month's work of the Franklinton Graded School in the W. S. Campaign resulted in buying \$567.41 of war saving stamps. The eighth grade is leading in the race, the fourth comes second and the seventh third. Rev. Mr. Sikes has offered a prize not to exceed \$10.00 to the winner of the first four grades. The school has offered a prize of \$10.00 and a second prize of \$5.00 to the winner in the entire school. Every grade except the tenth is organized and they say they are going to show the other grades something in the near future.

On Friday March 15th we had our little exercises and Miss Eugenia Boone, Principal of the Mt. Grove White school came over and explained to us about the war saving stamps and thrift stamps.
