IN MEMORIAM.
 On Friday morning, June 29th, 1919,
 God in His infinite wisdom took to
 himself by death Mr. D. I. Fuller.
 Mr. Fuller was a Franklin County citi-
 zen, residing in the Moulton section.
 From here God removed one of the
 county's best and most loyal support-
 ers of all things good and pure. He
 was a thrifty citizen, a loyal Christian
 and a friendly neighbor, scarcely sur-
 passed by any. He died in his sixty-
 third year, being 62 years, 7 months
 and 4 days of age. In his adversity,
 which was prolonged and intensified
 for several months, he bore his suffer-
 ing patiently, looking by faith through
 the "valley of the shadow of death"
 but fearing "no evil," for he had an
 enduring hope which did not fail him
 in his passing. The immediate com-
 munity is gloomed by his departure,
 but heaven we trust has been made
 brighter; for as the sun passes below
 the western hills only to shine else-
 where, leaving darkness behind; just
 so the redeemed soul is replaced to
 shine in heaven, leaving gloom and
 sadness on earth. But the bereaved
 are left to shine as the stars by night.
 Mr. Fuller's neighbors will suffer
 from his passing; for they believed in
 him and prospered under his influence,
 counsel and fatherly advice. He was
 industrious and God-fearing, constant-
 ly practicing thrift, economy and jus-
 tice. In this frugal use of means he
 was a good example, and remains so.
 The young people of his community,
 who desire success in life, might well
 take his life as a means to that end.
 For, though he perhaps did not prac-
 tice conservation of his energy as he
 may have done, yet, in the distribu-
 tion of his inherit powers he accumu-
 lated a very good sum of the pleasant
 things of life. He had looked for-
 ward with respectful interest to a
 "rainy day," and when it came he was
 ready; for he had fortified himself with
 the breastplate of righteousness, and
 as for his immediate family they are
 not left wanting except for him.
 Mr. Fuller was a member of Cor-
 inth Baptist church, faithful and loyal.
 As long as his health permitted
 he was at church to take his usual
 place, serving the Lord conscientiously
 and supporting the church admirably.
 Nor do we forget his service in
 the completion of the new church
 building, recently dedicated to the
 Lord's service. The pastor and church
 both will miss his presence, counsel
 and support.
 He was not only a Christian gentle-
 man but also, in his quiet way, a hu-
 manitarian, being a friend to the or-
 phans and needy. In the expression
 of his humane spirit he indulged freely
 in the support of the fatherless and
 motherless. Sandy Creek Masonic
 Lodge, No. 185, of which he was a
 member for 20 years, received from
 the hand and heart of this very much
 beloved friend and neighbor his best
 and loyal support.
 Of his time, which was always eco-
 nomically utilized, he gave freely to
 worthy public matters, being always
 ready and willing to propagate the
 noble things of public interest. He
 served many years on the school com-
 mittee in his district, which position
 gave vent to his desire to serve his
 community. His kind services which
 were far from being egotistical but
 rather quiet and silent, his noble hospi-
 tality, and his loyal friendship were
 all appreciated by his many friends.
 Mr. Fuller was twice married. He
 was first married in October 1855, to
 Miss Genobia A. Fuller, daughter of
 the late W. N. Fuller, surveyor of
 Franklin County and his second wife
 was Miss Annie E. Matsum, October
 1895, daughter of the late Rev. George
 Mangum, of Durham. To the first
 union there were born two children,
 Mr. W. D. Fuller of Wood, and a
 member of the Board of County Com-
 missioners of Franklin County, and
 Mrs. J. P. Parrish, of Moulton, both
 of whom now survive him. There
 were born of the last union five chil-
 dren, Masters George, David and Walter
 Fuller, and Misses Mary Susan
 and Ida Powell Fuller, all of whom,
 with his very faithful and devoted
 companion, survive him. The re-
 mains were placed at rest in North
 cemetery with the elaborate and con-
 spicuous ceremony of the Sandy Creek
 Masonic Lodge assisted by the J. H.
 Mills Lodge and visiting Masons from
 other lodges.
