NOTICE SPECIAL ELECTION FOR SCHOOL BONDS.

Upon the petition of the County Board of Education of Franklin County for an election to be held in Cedar Rock Academy District No. 3, Cedar Rock Township, Franklin County, State of North Carolina under the provisions of Chapter 5, Public Laws, 1915 of North Carolina, said petition being in due form. It is hereby ordered that an election be held in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 55, Public Laws, 1915 of North Carolina, at which election shall be ascertained the will of the people within said district whether there be issued bonds for the sum of Seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$7,500.00) for the purpose of rebuilding and repairing the school house in said district, said bonds to bear interest at the rate of six per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and said bonds to run for a period of twenty years the maximum tax rate to be levied for the payment of interest and principal of said bonds not to exceed thirty cents on the one hundred dollars property valuation and ninety cents on the poll. The said election shall be held on Saturday the 16th of August, 1919, the polling place to be at J. O. May's Store in said District. A new registration shall be made and J. O. May is hereby appointed Registrar and B. F. Gardner and J. T. Inscow are hereby appointed Poll-Holders for said election.

The boundaries of said district as fixed by the County Board of Education of Franklin County are as follows: Beginning at the county line at Red Bud Creek; thence up said Creek to the mouth of the branch running between Anna Collins' and Ollie Collins'; thence up said branch to its head; thence Westwardly to and along line of Buck Collins and Sam Bartholomew to Buck Collins' corner; thence South along Buck Collins' line to the path leading from John Mays' to Saints Delight; thence along said path to Saints Delight church; thence along G. W. Ford and Mrs. Tuckers' line Westwardly to Fords' corner; thence along lines of Ford, Dr. Bobbitt, W. O. Stone, J. R. Earl and Henry Harper to the Louisburg-Nashville Road; thence along that road Westwardly to J. A. and T. P. Deans' corner; thence along Deans' line to W. W. Boones' lines to John Westers' line and along Westers' line to the Raleigh Road; thence along Westers' and Mrs. Webbs' lines East to Peachtree Creek; thence down said Creek to the Coppedge Mill site; thence along the Spring Hope Road Northward to the Cedar Rock Church for colored people; thence along lines of Battle, Gordon and W. B. Coppedge Eastward to William Inscow's corner; thence along the lines of and including William Inscow, John Inscow and James T. Inscow and George Boone to the Shearin line; thence along Boone and Shearin line to the road leading by Boone's residence; thence along that road to the Louisburg and Nashville Road and along the Louisburg-Nashville Road to the County line at Belford Church; thence along County line to the beginning of the registration books shall be open from 9 o'clock A. M. to Sunset on each day (Sunday excepted) from July 11th, 1919 to August 2nd, 1919, and the Registrar will have said books at said polling place on each Saturday during said period from July 11th, 1919 to August 2nd, 1919.
