HUNGARIAN STEAK.

Chip one pound of round steak, add one egg, one-half cupful of rice. Scald large sized cabbage leaves, roll a portion of the meat mixture for one serving in each, fasten with toothpicks until five portions are made. Put in a kettle, cover with water and cook one hour. Season with paprika, thicken the gravy and serve.

Spiced Steak.—Melt two tablespoonfuls of butter, fry one large onion minced in it until a rich brown; take out the onion. Cut one flank steak in pieces, dredge with flour, fry in the butter, take out the meat, add two cupfuls of hot water, three tablespoonfuls of vinegar, one teaspoonful of mustard, one teaspoonful of salt and one-half teaspoonful of pepper. Thicken the gravy, put in a casserole and cook one hour. This will serve six people.

Nut Balls.—Take one cupful of chopped cold veal, add 12 chopped almonds, one egg, one-half teaspoonful of salt, pepper to taste. Mix and roll into balls, place in a baking pan and pour over one cupful of rich, highly seasoned tomato sauce. Serve on a platter garnished with water cress.

Tomato Sauce.—Take two cupfuls of tomato, add one slice of onion, one teaspoonful of salt, one-eighth of a teaspoonful of pepper, boil 20 minutes and strain. Add two tablespoonfuls of gelatin, dissolve in one-half cupful of cold water, celery salt, salt and bay leaf may be added to the first mixture before boiling. Strain and pour into a mold and cool.

Celery With Cheese.—Cut the coarser stalks of celery and cook until tender in boiling salted water. Place a layer of the cooked celery in a buttered baking dish, cover with a layer of rich, well seasoned white sauce, sprinkle generously with grated cheese and repeat with another layer of each. Finish the top with buttered crumbs and bake until the crumbs are brown.

Fruit Punch.—Shred, four oranges and two lemons. Add two cupfuls of water for each cupful of pulp, and sweeten to taste. Flavor with a small bottle of grape juice.

HOME DEMONSTRATION DEPARTMENT

We wish to call attention again to the dates for laying out the school grounds under the direction of Mr. Blair, of the State Department of Education:

On Friday, December 31st a Franklin County Council was formed, eight women, representing different townships of the county and a few of the professional men and constructive workers compose this Council. They will meet with the Home Demonstration Agent every two months for a discussion of the problems of the county. On Friday, Home Demonstration Work for 1921 was discussed. It was decided that the work as outlined below should be emphasized this year, the club officers and the teachers with the help of the Agent to decide on the work needed in the respective communities.
I. Interior furnishings and landscape gardening.
a. Bed rooms, size, shape and exposure to be considered.
b. Living rooms and dining rooms.
c. Table service and etiquette.
d. Arrangement of kitchens to save steps.
e. Installation of labor savers for women.
f. Finishing floors so that scouring will not be necessary.
g. What to do with the so called "Front Room."
h. Planting of yards.
i. Several school grounds laid off.
Mr. Blair of State Department to make plans.
H. Make commencement hats and dresses in several clubs. Assist all girls and women with spring hats who wish to make them.
III. Fireless cooker demonstrations and other home made conveniences as iceless refrigerator, well and spring boxes, etc.
IV. Planning of balanced menus school lunches to be especially em-

phasized.
V. Laundry. Study types of washing machines, removal of stains, and art of dyeing.
VI. Canning, pickling, preserving, jelly making, etc.
VII. Making winter hats, remodeling winter garments.
VIII. Lessons on "Home Care of Sick," text used by Red Cross Chapter for first aid nursing.
IX. Assist teachers by making entertainments.
a. Organizing societies and rural club programs for same.
b. Arranging plays, readings, lectures, etc.
c. Story telling, etc.
d. Games, etc.
X. "Housekeepers Week" in April.
XI. Short course for girls in July.
XII. Night Meetings.
a. Stereopticon music, reading, debates, talks, lectures.
b. Dr. Burrell's illustrated lectures, showing scenes taken in his travels over the world and wonderful costumes and other souvenirs from foreign countries.
