FRANKLIN COUNTY SCHOOL COLUMN

Items of Interest to Teachers, School Committees, Betterment Associations and People Interested in Public Schools of Franklin County.

1. Keep in touch with the school happenings by reading the School Column which will appear in the Franklin Times each week.

2. The Group Teachers' Meetings which were held in the county in the fall were well attended. There were five Group Centers: Harris and Dunn Townships at Bunn, E. L. Best Group Leader; Franklinton and Youngsville Townships at Youngsville, J. J. Ross Group Leader; Hayesville, Sandy Creek and Louisburg Townships at Louisburg, Hoy Taylor Group Leader; Gold Mine, Cedar Rock and Cypress Creek Townships at Cedar Rock, W. R. Mills Group Leader; High School Section at Louisburg, E. C. Sexton Group Leader. There were five meetings held in each of these groups besides two general meetings in Louisburg. All the teachers in the county except seven were enrolled in these meetings. The final examination on the work done in these meetings was given Saturday, December 20th. The following teachers from the Bunn Group Center and the High School Section passed a satisfactory examination and Reading Circle Certificates from the State Department of Education will be issued to them. The office has not yet received reports from the other Group Centers but as soon as this is done the names of the teachers in these Groups passing will be printed in the Column.

The object of these meetings is to increase our teaching ability, to make our actual school room work more effective. In order to make ourselves efficient in our school work we have to study our profession just as the Doctor, Farmer or Lawyer has to study his. More today than ever before are communities demanding trained teachers, those who are willing and striving to grow stronger in their work.

4. There should be a Betterment Association in each school district. Plans for organizing and suggestive programs for the meetings will gladly be furnished by the office upon request. Such an organization will be of untold help to the school community. It affords an opportunity to the teachers and the parents to learn each other, talk over common problems and work together for the betterment of the community. By thus getting together, the teachers and parents would also solve many school problems, such as questions of discipline, irregular attendance, etc. The work is intended to explain the object of these Associations, to better church, school and general living conditions in the community. The Superintendent would like to be more closely associated with these organizations than he has been heretofore. He will be glad to meet with any meeting of an Association whenever the members think that he can be of service to them.
