REPORT SHOWS EFFECT OF PRUNING KNIFE

MILLION FOR UNIVERSITY

Requests of State's Institutions Meritlessly Slashed—Out of \$19,918,490 Asked By Institutions, \$4,995,000 Is Granted.

Raleigh, Jan. 12.—Guessing at the budget commission's report, a highly entertaining indoor sport, ended today when that body laid its recommendations before the general assembly and fulfilled the Daily News scripture. Which scripture was to the effect that the University of North Carolina would get about \$1,000,000 instead of \$5,000,000 and that cutting had been deeply done. Against the \$19,918,490 asked by the institutions, the commission recommends \$4,995,000.

Following are the commission's recommendations for permanent improvements for the various state departments and institutions for the years 1921-22: State Hospital for the Insane, Morganton, \$10,000.00; State Hospital for the Insane, Goldsboro, \$300,000.00; State Hospital for the Insane, Raleigh, \$215,000.00; N. C. School for the Deaf, Morganton, \$20,000.00; N. C. School for the Blind, Raleigh, \$250,000.00; N. C. Tuberculosis Sanatorium, Sanatorium, \$300,000.00; State Home and Industrial School for Girls and Women, Samarcand, \$150,000.00; Stonewall Jackson Training school, Concord, \$100,000.00; Caswell Training school, Kinston, \$230,000.00; University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, \$990,000.00; State College of Agriculture and Engineering, Raleigh, \$500,000.00; N. C. College for Women, Greensboro, \$540,000.00; East Carolina Teacher Training school, Greenville, \$325,000.00; Cullowhee Normal and Industrial school, Cullowhee, and Appalachian Training school, Boone, \$200,000.00; State Normal School for Negroes, Elizabeth City, Colored Normal school Fayetteville, and Slater Colored Normal school, Winston-Salem, \$400,000.00; Negro Reformatory for Boys, \$25,000.00; Conversion of state prison into hospital for insane, Raleigh, \$350,000.00. Total, \$4,995,000.00.

For Maintenance.

For maintenance of the institutions during the present year a total of \$3,666,750 was recommended. For 1922 the recommendation is the same except in the case of the national guard, which would receive \$75,000 instead of \$50,000. The recommendations follow: State Hospital for the Insane, Morganton, \$400,000; State Hospital for the Insane Goldsboro, \$220,000; State Hospital for the Insane, Raleigh, \$320,000; N. C. School for the Deaf, Morganton, \$110,000; N. C. School for the Blind, Raleigh, \$110,000; N. C. Tuberculosis Sanatorium, Sanatorium, \$85,000; State Home and Industrial School for Girls and Women, Samarcand, \$50,000; Stonewall Jackson Training School, Concord, \$30,000. Additional amount of \$175 allowed for each boy admitted in excess of 100 boys; Caswell Training School, Kinston, \$80,000; University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, \$425,000; State College of Agriculture and Engineering, Raleigh, \$210,000; East Carolina Teacher Training School, Greenville, \$80,000; North Carolina College for Women, Greensboro, \$210,000; Negro Agricultural and Technical College, Greensboro, \$20,000; State Board of Health, \$225,000; State Laboratory of Hygiene, Raleigh, \$50,000; North Carolina National Guard, \$50,000; N. C. Geological and Economic Survey, \$20,000; North Carolina Historical Commission, \$20,000; North Carolina State Library, \$5,000; State Board of Charities and Public Welfare, \$20,000; State Child Welfare Commission, \$10,000; Confederate Soldiers' Home, Raleigh, \$60,000; Confederate Women's Home, Fayetteville, \$10,000; Confederate Soldiers' Pension Fund, \$650,000; Agricultural Experiment Station, Raleigh, \$1,250; Agricultural Extension Service, \$117,000; Library Commission, Raleigh, \$17,000; Mount Mitchell Park Commission, (to pay debt), \$1,000; Total, \$3,666,750. The institutions had asked for practically \$9,900,000 for maintenance for the years 1921-22.

NOTICE SPECIAL ELECTION FOR SCHOOL BONDS

Upon the petition of the County Board of Education of Franklin County for an election to be held in Cedar Rock Academy School District No. 3, Cedar Rock Township, Franklin County, State of North Carolina, said petition being in due form; It is ordered that an election be held in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 55, Public Laws, 1915, of North Carolina, and acts amendatory thereof, at which election shall be ascertained the will of the people within said district whether there be issued bonds for the sum of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000.00) for the purpose of building and repairing the school house in said district, said bonds to bear interest at the rate of six per centum per annum, payable semi-annually, and said bonds to run for a period of twenty years, the maximum tax rate to be levied for the payment of interest and principal of said bonds not to exceed seventeen cents on the one hundred dollars property valuation and fifty-seven cents on the poll. The said election shall be held on Saturday, the 12th day of February, 1921, the polling place to be Cedar Rock School Building in said district. A new registration shall be made and E. O. Stedje is hereby appointed Registrar and P. E. Dean and W. R. Fulghum are hereby appointed Pollholders for said election. The boundaries of said district as fixed by the County Board of Education of Franklin County are as follows: Beginning at the County line at Red Bud Creek; thence up said creek to the mouth of branch running between Anna Collins and Olive Collins; thence up said branch to its head; thence Westward to and along the line of Buck Collins and Sam Bartholomew to Buck Collins' corner; thence South along Buck Collins' line to the path leading from John May's to Saints' Delight; thence along said path to Saints' Delight Church; thence along G. W. Ford's and Mrs. Tucker's line Westward to Ford's corner; thence along line of Ford, Dr. Bobbitt, W. O. Stone, J. R. Earl, and Henry Harper to the Louisburg-Nashville Road; thence along that road Westward to J. A. and T. P. Dean's corner; thence along J. A. Dean's and W. W. Boone's lines to John Wester's line and along Wester's line to the Raleigh road; thence along Wester's and Mrs. Webb's lines East to Peachtree Creek; thence down said creek to the Coppedge Mill site; thence along the Spring Hope road North to the Cedar Rock church for colored people; thence along line of Battle Gordon and W. B. Coppedge Eastward to William Inascoe's corner; thence along the lines of and including William Inascoe, John Inascoe and James T. Inascoe and George Boone to the Shearin line;

thence along Boone and Shearin line to the road leading by Boone's residence; thence along that road to Louisburg-Nashville Road and along the County line at Belford Church; thence along County line to the beginning. The registration books shall be open from 9 o'clock A. M. to Sunset on each day (Sunday excepted) from January 8, 1921 to January 29, 1921, inclusive, and the Registrar will have said books at said polling place on each Saturday during said period from January 8, 1921 to January 29, 1921.
