MORE GROWERS MADE DEFENDANTS

Action For Damages and Injunctions Started Against Co-operative Members.

Suits for amounts aggregating \$1,600 complete with action for restraining orders were started by the Tri-State Tobacco Growers Co-operative Organization today against three farmers in three counties of North Carolina for alleged violation of the cooperative contracts. The defendants are H. A. Finch, of Kittrell, in Vance county; M. F. Morgan, Bailey, in Nash county; and R. T. Bachelor, Wallace, in Duplin county. Hearing on injunctions asked for to prevent the three defendants from selling tobacco outside the association will be heard before Judge C. C. Lyon in Louisburg, November 22.

H. A. Finch, it is alleged, disposed of 4,000 pounds of his 6,000-pound crop outside the association and is being sued for \$400 damages and attorneys fees; M. F. Morgan, it is claimed, sold 10,000 pounds of a 20,000-pound crop outside the association, and is being sued for \$1,000 in damages and attorneys fees; R. T. Bachelor, it is alleged, disposed of 1,200 pounds of his 3,800-pound crop outside the association and is being sued for \$210 in damages and attorneys' fees.—News-Observer.
