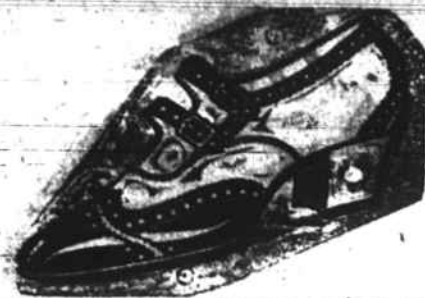

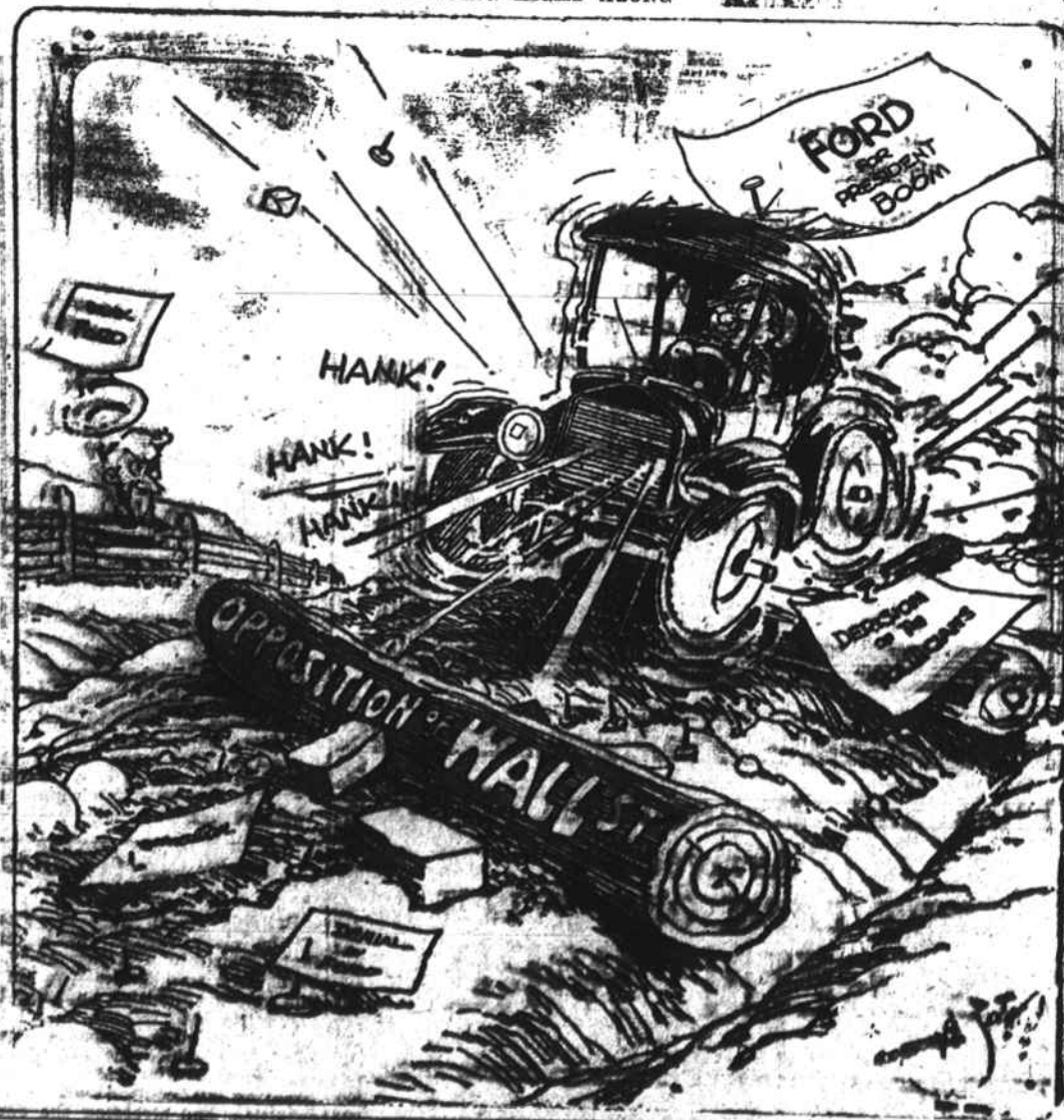

Handling The Sweet Potato Crop



Handling The Sweet Potato Crop

Raleigh, N. C. May 29. The best soil for sweet potatoes is a light well drained sandy loam with a clay subsoil. This light soil will give plenty of room for proper growth of the potato and produce one that is readily marketable. The clay subsoil will prevent the roots from growing deep into the ground and making a stringy potato. The disease known as scur is more severe on dark soils than on light and more the looks of the crop. There are some of the suggestions about the kind of soil to use for sweet potato growing as recommended by R. F. Payne of the Division of Horticulture, State College and State Department of Agriculture. He advises a fertilizer analysis

to 3 percent phosphoric acid, 2 to 3 percent nitrogen, and 3 to 4 percent potash, applied at the rate of from 500 to 1000 per acre. About half of this application should be applied in the row at planting time. To transplant the slips or draws, Mr. Payne suggests that the bed be thoroughly moistened before the plants are pulled. The plants are then wrapped with a piece of burlap, and for best results should be puddled in a tub containing a quantity of clay and manure before being set in the field. Mr. Payne suggests that a cloudy day be used for the transplanting and at least one-half pint of water used around each plant as it is being set. The plants should be set 23 inches apart on rows 3 to 3 1/2 feet wide. Good results are obtained from high ridging, as this gives the roots

plenty of room to develop. Vine cuttings are more profitable than draws since they give a larger percentage of marketable potatoes," says Mr. Payne. Farmers of Halifax County purchased 5,000 baby chicks, a carload of Holstein and Guernsey cattle, formed a seed breeder's association and sold a carload of graded sweet potatoes in Los Angeles California, at 35 cents per bushel, according to recent reports from the county agent.
