NEW FOWN ORDINANCES Ordinance passed at the meeting of the Town Commissioners, June 11th, 1923:

The Commissioners of the Town of Lcuisburg, N. C., do hereby enact and ordain that all owners of Automobiles, Trucks, and Motor driven vehicles in the Town of Louisburg, N. C. be required to pay a License Tax to said Town of \$1.00. All owners of said Motor Vehicles are hereby required to register said Vehicles with the Town Clerk on or before June 30th, 1923 and annually thereafter.
