-Chief of Police B. H. Meadows informs us that he is going to enforce the law requiring City licenses by August 10th. All persons not having one had better get it.



THE POULTRY NEEDS OF NORTH

Raleigh, July 31.—Speaking to a recent gathering of bankers at the State College, Dr. B. F. Kanpp head of the poultry work of the College and experiment station called attention to some of the vital needs of the poultry industry in this State. Dr. Kaupp pointed out that the State is producing only \$18,079,000.00 worth of poultry products each year and this is not enough for the needs of North Carolina. No eggs and poultry should be lina. No eggs and poultry should be imported into the State when condi-tions are so favorable to producing these products at home and the bank-ers, could help in encouraging the movement for more and better poul-

Large hatcheries for supplying day-old chicks could be established suc-cessfully in North Carolina, stated Dr. Kaupp, and money now sent out of the State could be used for buying eggs from the farmers for use in these hat-cheries and day old chicks turned out for the use of both rural and urban dwellers.

He said further, "We need county poultry associations for standardis-ing the farm flocks, for standardising ing the farm flocks, for standardising and grading eggs and table fowls, for culting birds and for shipping in car lots the surplus poultry from the farms. The bankers occupy a strategic position in this state-wide poultry development scheme and can help if they only would."
