

A GREAT FORM CONVENTION

Ralcigh, Auggust 7.— With 797 farm ers and their wives registed for the second day and the number greatly swelled by automobiles coming in loaded with occupants on each of the three days, the twenty-first annual convention of farm folks passed into history last week as one of the most in the State College. The program was interesting and replete with strong top. ics ably discussed by leaders in the following described real estate, on agricultural world. Of greater intefest than anything else, perhaps, were the experience meetings of the farmers themselves when they told of how

they did things on the horte farm.

There were a greater number of farm women than ever before. The women's section decided to unite its program for the future under the Home Bureaus and the Convention from now on will be. 'The Farmers' and Home Bureau Convention of North Carolina."

Business matters, farm finance, live stock and the bolt weevil were the main topics for the men. Selling surplus produce, putting the garden into the pantry, and beautifying the home and farmstead were the leading topics discussed by the women. een under way.
