**DON'T SCRUB THE SILVER—USE MODERN METHODS**

"If your silver is tarnished and you would like to get it with very little effort, put into a bright clean aluminum pan one tablespoonful of soda and one of cast." says Mrs. Jane S. McKimmon, State Agent in Home Demonstration Work. "Pour on this a quart of boiling water and add your tarnished silver. Let the water cover the silver and it will be only a short while before it emerges bright and shining."

"When the tarnish is removed, wash in hot soapy water and rub with a soft cloth. Silver is tarnished by the sulphur from gas and by burning coal or more frequently by certain foods which contain sulphur and is easily cleaned by this method."

"The aluminum pan method of cleaning does not injure the silver in any way," states Mrs. McKimmon, "and is easier by far than the old way of scrubbing. When the silver is put into the pan, it is in a position to be cleaned by the soda."

base which is to a certain extent like an electrode and action takes place between the metals and the chemicals used. When paste or powder is used for cleaning there is danger of scratching the silver but it gives a satiny finish that is very beautiful and frequently the housewife will use a soft cloth with a bit of paste to produce this effect after she removes the tarnish with the aluminum pan process."

**USE GOOD SEED OATS THIS FALL**

Raleigh, August 15.—It will soon be time to think of planting the oat crop and many farmers plant oats in cotton at the last cultivation. In planning for the crop this fall, Dr. R. Y. Winters, plant breeder for the State College and Department of Agriculture, urges North Carolina growers to think more about their own home grown seed. Last year he found seed oats that had been brought in from New York and other distant states, while the results of tests made over many years show that home grown seed from selected plants have always yielded higher returns than these imported seed.

For instance, Dr. Winters gives the case of oats grown by the Edgcombe Seed Breeders' Association which yielded 43 bushels to the acre, as compared with a yield of 30 bushels to the acre secured from commercial seed. The Edgcombe growers, of course, select their own seed and keep them pure.

At Statesville, on the farm of J. V. Watts, tests made in cooperation with Dr. Winters showed that the commercial seed yielded about 50 bushels per acre while plants from a selected strain bought from a neighboring farmer who bred his oats, gave a yield of 67 bushels per acre. On the Piedmont Branch Station Farm near Statesville, Dr. Winters completed a test this year in which he secured a yield of 45.6 bushels per acre from his own selected strain of Apple oats grown on the farm, as compared with only 28.2 bushels per acre from seed secured from a commercial source. Dr. Winters states that such differences in yield as these are well worth considering and recommends that North Carolina growers pay more attention to their oat seed this fall, using selected home grown seed if possible.

**175 SIGN CONTRACTS DURING WEEK**

Raleigh, Aug. 21.—Growing interest in the south-wide membership drive is shown in reports received by Homer H. B. Mack, Manager of the Field Service Department of the North Carolina Cotton Growers Cooperative Association. Reports from locals show 175 contracts signed during the past week with a number of locals yet to report. Special effort is being made in Warren, Cabarrus, Cleveland, Rutherford, Polk and Lincoln counties.

Arrangements have been made for a county-wide drive in Rowan with the assistance of local leaders together with a number of interested business men. Field workers in the North eastern district have completed preliminary work for a district drive. Manager Mack confidently expects a membership of thirty-five thousand when the campaign closes.

**AN ORDINANCE TO REPEAL AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$50,000 FUNDING BONDS.**

An Ordinance to Repeal an Ordinance Authorizing the Issuance of \$50,000 Funding Bonds.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE TOWN OF LOUISBURG, N. C.

Section 1. That that certain ordinance adopted by the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Louisburg, N. C. on 28th day of June 1923 authorizing the issuance of \$50,000.00 Funding Bonds, be and the same is hereby repealed, rescinded, made null and void and of no effect.

Section 2. That this ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage.

**AN ORDINANCE TO AUTHORIZE THE TOWN OF LOUISBURG TO ISSUE \$17,500 ELECTRIC LIGHT BONDS.**

Be it Ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Louisburg: Section 1. That under and pursuant to The Municipal Finance Act of the Town of Louisburg do issue its bonds for the purpose of improving and enlarging the present existing electric light plant of said Town.

Section 2. That the maximum aggregate principal amount of the bonds shall be \$17,500.

Section 3. That a tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of the bonds shall be annually levied and collected.

Section 4. That a statement of debt of the municipality has been filed with

the Clerk and is open to public inspection.

Section 5. That this ordinance shall take effect thirty days after its first publication unless in the meantime a petition for its submission to the voters is held under The Municipal Finance Act, and that in such event it shall take effect when approved by the voters of the municipality at an election as provided for in the said The Municipal Finance Act.

The foregoing ordinance was passed on the 20th day of August, 1923, and was first published on the 24th day of August, 1923.

Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said ordinance must be commenced within thirty days after its first publication.

**AN ORDINANCE TO AUTHORIZE THE TOWN OF LOUISBURG TO ISSUE \$14,000 SEWER BONDS.**

Be it Ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Louisburg: Section 1. That under and pursuant to The Municipal Finance Act of the Town of Louisburg do issue its bonds for the purpose of extending the present existing sanitary sewer system of said Town.

Section 2. That the maximum aggregate principal amount of the bonds shall be \$14,000.

Section 3. That a tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of the bonds shall be annually levied and collected.

Section 4. That a statement of debt of the municipality has been filed with the Clerk and is open to public inspection.

Section 5. That this ordinance shall take effect thirty days after its first publication unless in the meantime a petition for its submission to the voters is filed under The Municipal Finance Act, and that in such event it shall take effect when approved by the voters of the municipality at an election as provided for in the said The Municipal Finance Act.

The foregoing ordinance was passed on the 20th day of August, 1923, and was first published on the 24th day of August, 1923.

Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said ordinance must be commenced within thirty days after its first publication.

**AN ORDINANCE TO AUTHORIZE THE TOWN OF LOUISBURG TO ISSUE \$4,000 STREET IMPROVEMENT BONDS.**

Be it Ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Louisburg: Section 1. That under and pursuant to The Municipal Finance Act of the Town of Louisburg do issue its bonds for the purpose of constructing or reconstructing the surface of roads, streets or highways within said Town, including or not including the contemporaneous construction of sidewalks, curbs, gutters or drains, and including grading of which local improvements at least one-fourth of the cost, exclusive of the cost of paving at street intersections, is to be specially assessed.

Section 2. That the maximum aggregate principal amount of the bonds shall be \$4,000.

Section 3. That a tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of the bonds shall be annually levied and collected.

Section 4. That a statement of debt of the municipality has been filed with the Clerk and is open to public inspection.

Section 5. That this ordinance shall take effect upon its passage and shall not be submitted to the voters.

The foregoing ordinance was passed on the 20th day of August, 1923, and was first published on the 24th day of August, 1923.

Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said ordinance must be commenced within thirty days after its first publication.

**AN ORDINANCE TO AUTHORIZE THE TOWN OF LOUISBURG TO ISSUE \$7,500 FUNDING BONDS.**

Be it Ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Louisburg: Section 1. That under and pursuant to The Municipal Finance Act of the Town of Louisburg do issue \$7,500 bonds for the purpose of funding and paying a like amount of valid subsisting indebtedness of said Town now outstanding and created before December 5th, 1921, which indebtedness is evidenced by note due or to become due within one year from the passage of this ordinance.

Section 2. That the face amount of the existing indebtedness of the Town of Louisburg which is now outstanding, having been canvassed and ascertained by this Board, is \$23,434.76, of which amount \$7,500 was created and outstanding prior to December 5, 1921, and that the maximum aggregate principal amount of the bonds herein authorized to be issued shall be \$7,500.

Section 3. That a tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of the bonds shall be annually levied and collected.

Section 4. That a statement of debt of the municipality has been filed with the Clerk and is open to public inspection.

Section 5. That this ordinance shall take effect upon its passage and shall not be submitted to the voters.

The foregoing ordinance was passed on the 20th day of August, 1923, and was first published on the 24th day of August, 1923.

Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said ordinance must be commenced within thirty days after its first publication.
