NOTICE OF AN ELECTION OF THE BOARD OF GRADED SCHOOL TRUSTEES BY THE VOTERS OF LOUISBURG GRADED SCHOOL DISTRICT

Notice is hereby given that, in accordance with the provisions of an Act of the General Assembly of North Carolina, House Bill Number 489, Senate Bill Number 581, entitled "An Act to Provide for the Election of the Board of Trustees of the Louisburg Graded School District by the people" adopted by the session of 1923, the Mayor and Board of Commissioners of the Town of Louisburg do hereby order an election to be held on Wednesday, October 31st, 1923, at which there shall be submitted to the qualified voters of Louisburg Graded School District the question of the election of a Board of Trustees of the Louisburg Graded School District.

The member who receives the highest vote at such election shall serve for a term of six years; the three members who receive the next highest vote at such election shall be elected to serve for a term of four years and the remaining three members so elected shall serve for a term of two years.

The Court House in Louisburg is hereby designated as the polling place; and B. B. Perry is hereby appointed Registrar, and E. F. Yarborough and R. H. Davis are hereby appointed Pollholders and Judges of Election.

No new registration is required; but the Registration Books shall be kept open each day at the office of B. B. Perry in the First National Bank building, Louisburg, and at the court house on each Saturday beginning Saturday, September 22nd, and closing Saturday, October 20th, 1923, for the registration of those electors who have become qualified since the last registration, in said Graded School District.

Those voting at such election shall cast a ballot upon which there shall be written or printed the names of those seven members of said Board of Trustees for whom they desire to vote.
