Income Tax In Nutshell.

United States Revenue Collector, Gilliam Grissom sends out the following information in regard to filing Income Tax returns:

WHO? The following must file U. S. Income Tax Returns: ALL SINGLE persons with net income of \$1,000 or more; ALL MARRIED persons with net income of \$2,000 or more; ALL PERSONS with gross income of \$5,000 or more; ALL CORPORATIONS; ALL PARTNERSHIPS; ALL FIDUCIARIES. EVERY PERSON (whether due income tax or not) has the privilege of filing a RETURN to make known his taxable or non-taxable status. RETURNS must be filed whether you are TAXABLE or NON-TAXABLE.

ALL who pay wages or salaries of \$1,000 or more must report same.

WHEN? Before middle of MARCH. WHERE? With U. S. Collector Internal Revenue at Raleigh, N. C. or with my Deputy Collector.

HOW? Upon blank Income Tax Return forms furnished upon request.

WHAT IF YOU FAIL? Every person, partnership, fiduciary, corporation failing to file are DELINQUENT and liable to PENALTY or PROSECUTION.

BOOZE VALUED \$200,000 FOUND IN RAILROAD CAR

Denver, Feb. 20.—A refrigerator car shipped from "some point in California" and containing bonded liquor estimated by police to have a value of approximately \$200,000 was placed under heavy police guard when it reached the railroad yards here late last night. The car was assigned to Cleveland, Ohio. Police refuse to give the name of the consignee.

The car will be turned over to Federal prohibition agents today.

Police said the shipment was billed as "non-intoxicating wine."

Slump Not Due to Association Selling.

Raleigh, Feb. 20.—Reports from New York that the recent slump in cotton prices was due in part to the heavy selling by the North Carolina Cotton Growers Association, are declared to be without basis in fact by U. B. Blalock, general manager of the association.

Mr. Blalock says the association is adhering to its policy of orderly sales, and that it is under no necessity of dumping cotton on the market and has not done so. He indicated last night that no sales are now being made, as he said the association is well ahead of its announced schedule of monthly sales.

Two advances have already been made to members of the association, he explained, and enough cotton has already been sold to permit another advance to be made in the spring and preparations are now under way for getting that out at the proper time.
