State fisheries commission awards contract for opening inlet from Pamlico Sound to ocean.

Tarboro—New "Snow Hill railway" to be built as extension of East Carolina railroad, opening up new territory in Greene county.

North Wilkesboro—Erection of new building for Horton Telephone company proposed.

Southern Pines—new Carolina theater completed.

Hot Springs—New knitting mill reports good business.

Cliffside—Paving of north Main street progressing rapidly.

Greensboro—Piedmont Ice & Coal company erecting new plant in this city.

High Point—Additional fire equipment being installed.

Cliffside—New bridge being built spanning river.

Greensboro—Southern Railway company to erect new station in this city.

Charlotte—Purchase of 225-acre park grounds proposed.

Wilmington—Contract awarded for constructing river docks at new distributing station of American Molasses company.

Contracts awarded for erection of new school buildings at Princeton and Glendale.

Greensboro—Erection of new \$1,000,000 hotel under consideration.

Winston-Salem—Southern Railway company to erect new freight station in this city.

Fort Bragg—Installation of new \$50,000 broadcasting station completed.

Charlotte—New hotel Charlotte completed.

Cotton consumed during January amounted to 576,604 bales of lint and 40,281 of linters, as compared with 461,560 bales of lint and 40,892 of linters in December. Exports during January totaled 546,252 bales. Cotton spindles active during the month aggregated 33,329,895.
