REGIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTIONS

During the period from April 4 to 17 inclusive, the Sunday School workers of all evangelical denominations in North Carolina will have the opportunity of attending four Regional Sunday School Conventions conducted under the auspices of the North Carolina Sunday School Association.

Under the plan of organization of the North Carolina Sunday School Association, the State is divided into four regions of approximately twenty-five counties each. In the even years four regional conventions are held, and in the odd years there is one general State-wide convention. This being the year for the regional conventions, the meetings will be held as follows:

The East Central Region will hold its convention in the Methodist Church at Sanford, N. C., Friday, Saturday and Sunday, April 4, 5 and 6. The convention will open at Friday afternoon, April 4, and continue through Sunday night. J. A. Overton, Sanford, is General Chairman of the Local Committee on Arrangements.

For the Western Region the Convention will be held in the First Baptist Church, Asheville, N. C., Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, April 8, 9 and 10. The Convention will open on Tuesday afternoon and continue through Thursday night. General Chairman of the Local Committee on Arrangements is Chester A. Brown, Asheville.

The West Central Region will hold its convention in the First Methodist Church, Salisbury, N. C., Friday, Saturday and Sunday, April 11, 12 and 13. The first session will be held on Friday afternoon. General Chairman of the Local Committee on Arrangements is A. H. Snider, Salisbury.

The Convention in the Eastern Region will be held in Howard Memorial Presbyterian Church, Tarboro, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, April 15, 16 and 17, with the opening session being held on Tuesday afternoon, April 15. R. B. Peters, Jr., of Tarboro, is General Chairman of the Local Committee on Arrangements.

Programs for the four conventions are in charge of a committee composed of the general officers of the State Sunday School Association and the Regional presidents, who are: State President, J. B. Ivey, Charlotte; Chairman Executive Committee, J. M. Broughton, Raleigh; Treasurer, E. B. Crow, Raleigh; General Superintendent, D. W. Sims, Raleigh; President East Central Region, Dr. W. A. Withers, Raleigh; President Eastern Region, R. B. Peters, Jr., Tarboro; President West Central Region, Dr. C. M. Van Poole, Salisbury; President Western Region, Thos. P. Pruitt, Hickory.

On the programs for the different conventions will appear seven Sunday School experts of national reputation. In charge of special conferences for workers in the Cradle Roll, Beginners, Primary and Junior Departments of the Sunday School will be Mrs. W. L. Blankinship, Atlanta, Ga., Associate Superintendent of the Tabernacle Baptist Sunday School. Mrs. Blankinship is considered an authority on plans and methods of work in the children's departments of the Sunday School, as well as a specialist in the work of training Sunday School teachers.

For special conferences and addresses on the work with young people between the years of twelve and twenty-four, Frank D. Getty, Philadelphia, Associate Director of Young People's work in the Presbyterian Church, C. S. A., and Fred D. Cartwright, Albany, N. Y., Young People's Division Superintendent of New York State Sunday School Association, have been secured.

Conferences for workers in Adult Bible classes will be in charge of Abner B. Brown, Baltimore, Md., General Secretary of the Maryland Sunday School Association, and Dr. E. B. Quick, Atlanta, Ga., Educational Superintendent for the Southeastern District of the Christian Disciples church.

Sunday School Superintendents and other general administrative officers will have special conferences under the direction of Dr. D. Burt Smith, Philadelphia, Pa., of the Sunday School Department of the United Evangelical Lutheran Church, and Prof. A. M. Locker, Chicago, Ill., Field Superintendent for the International Sunday School Council of Religious Education.

About thirty-five of the best Sunday School workers in each of the four regions will help with the programs. Those will represent practically all evangelical denominations in the State.

Entertainment at each of the conventions will be on the "Harvard Plan," lodging and breakfast being furnished free to all delegates. As the delegates arrive in the convention cities they will register and be assigned homes for the time they are to be in attendance upon the conventions.

State Superintendent, D. W. Sims, has just returned from visits to the four convention cities and reports that each place is very enthusiastic and all are in readiness for the conventions.
