TOBACCO GROWERS ELECT DIRECTORS

Strong Endorsement of Assn. in Vote
of 35,000 Members—Return 19 of 22
Leaders.

(S. D. Frissell)
The election of directors in the To-
bacco Growers Cooperative Associa-
tion on Tuesday May 29, resulted in an
overwhelming vote of confidence in the
management of the association. Out of
the 22 directors elected by the 35,000
associated tobacco farmers of three
states 19 were returned to office.

The governors of Virginia, North
Carolina and South Carolina also re-
appointed the public directors of those
states, namely, Oliver J. Sands for
Virginia, Clarence Poe for North
Carolina and E. C. Epps for South
Carolina. Of the three new directors
whose election was confirmed at the
annual meeting of the tobacco as-
sociation in Raleigh last Tuesday,
two were from North Carolina and
one from Virginia, the South Carolin-
ians returning a solid delegation to
the board.

In Virginia W. E. Gardner, promi-
nent farmer and business man of Pitt-
sylvania county succeeds Frank O.
McCormick of Leno as director of the
largest tobacco growing county of the
south. Mr. Gardner is vice-president
and a director of the American Nation-
al Bank of Danville, also vice-presi-
dent and director of the Agricultural
Credit Corporation of Virginia. He was
one of the first men in Pittsylvania
county to sign the marketing con-
tract and was one of the very few
prominent men in the city of Danville
to back the cooperative marketing
movement from its beginning. Accord-
ing to Mr. McCormick the retiring di-
rector, his successor will have the
loyal support of the six thousand mem-
bers of the association in Pittsylvania
county who he states are better orga-
nized today than ever before.

In Western North Carolina T. T.
Hawkes prominent farmer and mer-
chant of North Carolina succeeds Clyde P.
Harris of Mapleville as director of the
seventh district where Mr. Hawkes
has been a constant supporter of the
tobacco association from its early be-
ginning.

A. M. Dumay of Washington, N. C.
succeeds J. V. Cobb of Pinetops as
director of the fifth district. Mr. Du-
may is president of the First National
Bank of Washington, N. C., vice-presi-
dent of The American Bankers Associa-
tion and a tobacco planter in Beau-
fort county.

Unanimous elections by the asso-
ciated growers marked the return of
a number of the tobacco association's
directors to office and the change of
only three directors in three states is
regarded as a remarkable endorse-
ment of the marketing association.

The payment of a half a million dol-
lars by the associatin to its members
of the dark-fired and sun-cured areas
of Virginia last week brought satis-
faction to the farmers who gathered
in crowds at twenty markets and came
in time to assist them in the prepara-
tion of another crop. Last Thursday's
payment to the dark-fired planters
brought their total advances on the
1922 crop up to ninety percent of the
bankers valuation. The sun-cured
grows whose 1923 crop has sold faster
have now received seventy-five per-
cent of its valuation by the bankers.

Checks are now being made out
for association members in Eastern
North Carolina who delivered tobacco
of the 1923 crop. A second payment
of more than a million dollars on last
season's deliveries will be made from
the association warehouses in East-
ern Carolina not later than June 15.

NORTH CAROLINA SENDS DELEGATE TO NATIONAL HOLSTEIN CONVENTION

North Carolina breeders of Hol-
stein cattle will be represented at
the 29 annual convention of The Hol-
stein-Friesian Association of America
at Richmond, Virginia, June 4th by
Tom Pemberton of Greensboro. Thirty
eight states and one Canadian province
have elected 148 delegates to attend
this meeting, the first to be held in
"Dixie" by the national Holstein as-
sociation.
