CAMPAIGN NEARER THE GOAL

\$133,119 REPORTED WEDNESDAY
NIGHT

Final Report Friday Night—List of Contributors—Standing of Divisions And Teams—Mr. Ruffin Speaks Complimentary to Workers and Contributors.

The Campaign for \$150,000 for Greater Louisburg College has been forging ahead steadily this week and Wednesday night the workers had reported a total of \$133,119. This left a balance of \$16,881 to get in order to go over the top, and the team members are working feverishly to raise this amount by Friday night of this week, when they will have their closing report supper.

Division C. led by Mrs. W. E. White is still in the lead, having secured over \$51,000. A report by teams is given below.

At the report Wednesday, Mr. Wm. H. Ruffin, Chairman of the Campaign, spoke most cordially to the workers of his appreciation for their energy and persistence. He told them that their co-operation and effectiveness had astonished him, that they had achieved results which he had not dreamed to be possible a month ago. One of Youngsville's Leading Citizens — Entered at Oak Level Tuesday

Janadus C. Winston, one of Youngsville and Franklin County's most progressive and leading citizens died at his home near Youngsville on Sunday night in his 77th year. Mr. Winston had been in bad health for several years.

On November 8, 1870 he was married to Miss Menrietta Tharrington, from which union there were eight children, all of whom including Mrs. Winston survive. The children are Mrs. L. H. Ragan and Miss Gertrude Winston, of Youngsville, Mrs. S. C. Holden, of Louisville, Capt. S. E. Winston, Messrs. Lemuel E. and Janadus E. Winston, of Youngsville, M. Eaton Winston, of Rocky Mount, Capt. Herman E. Winston, of Enfield.

He was a man of generous impulses, possessed with a big and tender heart and a sympathetic hand. He was an ideal husband, a loving father, a good neighbor and a useful and valuable citizen. For a number of years he served his county as a member of the Board of Commissioners with much profit to the county and credit to himself. Franklin County, and Youngsville in particular, has lost one of its most substantial and influential citizens.

The funeral was conducted from the Christian church at Youngsville on Tuesday afternoon by his pastor, Rev. J. R. Johnson, of Fuquay Springs, assisted by Rev. J. W. Patton, assistant Grand Lecturer of the Masonic Fraternity, of Greensboro, and Rev. C. L. Dowell, pastor of the Baptist church of Franklin and the interment was made at the Oak Level cemetery with Masonic honors conducted by the Youngville Lodge, of which he was a faithful member and visiting Masons from Louisburg, Franklin and other lodges.
