**STUDYING CONTROL OF BOLL WEEVIL**

Raleigh, September 30.—A group of men recognized as leaders in progressive agricultural measures, spent Friday in Raleigh. These gentlemen are members of the National Council of the Association of Southern Agricultural Workers. They are touring the Cotton States and studying the plans and methods of boll weevil control.

These agricultural specialists have already visited the Agricultural headquarters in the States of Florida and Georgia before coming to Raleigh. From here they go to Clemson College, S. C., and the Auburn, Alabama and Tallulah, Louisiana with a brief stop in Mississippi and possibly one in Tennessee. The members of the Council who visited the Agricultural Department of North Carolina State College yesterday, were: Dr. H. W. Barre, Director of the South Carolina Experiment Station; Professor J. D. Blackwell, Professor of Agronomy at Clemson College, S. C.; A. E. Grantham, representing the Virginia-Carolina Chemical Company; J. T. Jackson, Agriculturist of the Central Railroad of Georgia; G. A. Maloney, Director of the Delta Bureau and Laboratory at Tallulah, Louisiana; J. A. Evans, specialist in Agronomy of the United States Department of Agriculture; Dr. W. E. Hines, Etymologist of the Louisiana Experiment Station. These gentlemen spent the day with Dr. B. W. Kilgore of the State College and Department of Agriculture and discussed with him the work of boll weevil control in North Carolina. Dr. Kilgore is the North Carolina member of the Cotton Council and has been so for a number of years—in fact he was the Secretary of the Association of Southern Agricultural workers for twelve years. Dr. Hines said with a smile, that Dr. Kilgore was really the Grand-daddy of the Association.

The Association of Southern Agricultural Workers is composed of workers of the State and Federal Departments of Agriculture; agricultural colleges; and representatives of manufacturing concerns and railroads that are interested in bettering the agricultural conditions in the South.

**PARENTAL RESPONSIBILITY**

Parents are at fault in more than ninety percent of the accidents in which children are killed or injured by automobiles, the coroner of a mid-west city has discovered. In the remaining ten percent, motorists were speeding or driving carelessly.

This same average may not prevail in all parts of the country, but it is probably about representative of the average city or town.

No one condones reckless or careless driving of automobiles, but there are accidents which the driver can not avoid and which are due entirely to the irresponsibility of children.

Death or injuries that may make them life-long cripples should ever be held up before children as the danger that lurks in the street, in the form of automobiles, that may crush their little bodies and break their bones.

They cannot be warned too frequently of this menace. They should be taught never to cross a street without first looking both ways. They can not be too cautious. The responsibility is clearly upon the shoulders of parents.

**SCHOOL FIRES**


Fatalities in school building fires for the most part attract only local attention, but a chance flame or spark that might be the means of wiping out many youthful lives, is an ever presence menace that should be guarded against by school authorities.

As the season is here for the firing of furnaces and stoves in school buildings, it behooves those who have this work in charge to be ever on the alert for fire.

Though fire-proof construction of school buildings is followed now, there are still many virtual fire traps in use. And although old buildings are being replaced by more modern ones, the average for the United States is five school fires every day in the year.

Fire drills are almost universally practiced in the public schools, but they must be regarded as supplementary precautions, not primary ones; they merely reduce the consequences

**CLEAN PICTURES**

The Association of Motion Picture Producers, Inc., composed of the leading producers and distributors, has adopted resolutions pledging its members not to produce or promote the production, distribute or promote the exhibition or aid in any way whatsoever in the production, distribution or exhibition of motion pictures which, "because of the unfit character of title, story, exploitation or picture itself, do not meet the requirements" of what amounts to a code of ethics adopted by the association.

The preamble to the resolutions places the members of the association back of a "continuing effort to establish and maintain the highest possible moral and artistic standards of motion picture production." It is set forth that every attempt will be made to prevent the prevalent type of book and play to become the prevalent type of picture.

Will H. Hays the czar of moviedom, is credited with bringing about the changed attitude of the producers and distributors. It all sounds very interesting, but what the public wants to see is the fruits of the announced intentions of the producers to establish the "highest possible moral" standards in the industry.

There is a plenty of room for improvement in the motion picture business and everyone who enjoys a good, clean show is pulling for the organization to live up to its code of ethics.

The lurid sex plays that have replaced the wild western holiday dramas of a few years ago have no place on the screen. They are frequently mild compared with that which they are pictured to be in the advance announcements.

Improvements in advertising methods of the distributors would be a great aid to the producers in squaring their performances with their promise.
