

Sink rarely has any spare moments. The State borrowed \$6,000,000 for sixty days at three per cent during the week. The money will be used for current obligations and will be repaid with revenues collected.

The Rev. William S. Shacklette of Burlington will be the first prison chaplain and welfare officer of the State prison system. He was appointed during the week and will give his entire time to the convicts.

The rate case to be heard in Richmond this week involving North Carolina intra-state and inter-state rates will be followed with interest here. The State will be represented by able counsel to fight the case which was brought by the state of Virginia.

The Department of Public Instruction has announced that North Carolina high school students who attend Citizens Military Training Camps this summer will be allowed a quarter of a credit on their high school courses. The State is the first in the South to take such action.

The State speed limits were increased last Friday to 35 miles on the open highways, 20 in residential districts and 10 to 12 miles in congested districts. This is according to the act increasing the limit passed by the last legislature which authorized them to become effective on May 1.

The Corporation Commission is facing a problem that may give some trouble. A negro purchased a ticket to ride on a bus and was refused the privilege. He insisted and the driver allow him to and the Commission, which has supervision over busses, probably will have to settle the case. If the busses are common carriers, and there seems little reason to regard them otherwise, the negroes are entirely within their rights in requesting transportation and it may be that the bus companies will have to make provision for them. The attorney general states he will rule on the matter when the case is actually presented to him.

Governor McLean during the week discussed the Department of Conservation which he requested the legislature to create to take over the Geological and Economic Survey. The new department, his excellency states, will be charged with furnishing data on North Carolina to all inquirers and generally will exploit the industries and potentialities of N. C. He has great plans for the Department and is expected to appoint a head for it in the near future.

Hardy Wiggins and Merritt Miller who have spent nine years in the penitentiary for the murder of Phil Phillips in Graham county have been given their freedom by the Governor. He says there is doubt as to their guilt. The case at the time was hard fought and doubt was then expressed as to whether the men had had any connection with the crime.
