## FRUITS AND VEGETABLES IN THE DIET.

Raleigh, August 31.—Nutrition experts tell us that we must use larger amounts of fruits and vegetables than we are accustomed to if we wish a healthy life and ward off many diseases which are brought about by a faulty diet. These foods tends to correct many of the shortcomings of the common American diet, of meat, potatoes and white bread. A liberal amount of milk, fruit and vegetables, the "protective" foods, should be included in the diet of children and adults.

"There are some simple rules that one may use in figuring out the amounts of fruits and vegetables which

a family will need," says Maude E. Wallace, Assistant State Agent in home demonstration work. "Plan to use two vegetables besides potatoes or rice everyday. If possible, use one green, uncooked vegetables such as celery, cabbage or lettuce, or at least on those days on which oranges or tomatoes are not served, as this assures one of the necessary vitamins being included in the diet. Canned or canned stored vegetables may make up the rest.

"Plan to use two fruits every day and whenever possible use uncooked fruit. This demand is easily met during the plentiful supply of peaches and with apples, pears and grapes ripening it should be easy to have fresh fruit through the fall months.

"In order that fruits and vegetables may be available for use the year around enough should be canned to meet the needs of the family. Girls and women in their club work should make an estimate of the amount of canning they will need to do to meet this and this should be so planned that there will be a variety for the months when fresh things are not available."
